

PRESIDENT: Previous question has been moved. Does the Chair see 5 hands. Thank-you. Question is, shall the debate now close? All those in favor will vote aye, all those opposed will vote no.

CLERK: Senator Clark voting aye, for whatever value that is.

PRESIDENT: Question is, Senator Clark, you can't vote from up here. Sorry about that. Previous question has been moved by Senator Carpenter. Question is, shall the debate now close? All those in favor, vote aye. All those opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Once again, have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 19 ayes, 15 nays.

PRESIDENT: Motion to close debate fails. That requires a majority of the elected members. That's 25 votes. The debate will continue. Senator Marsh was next to speak.

SENATOR MARSH: I have a question for Senator Whitney please.

PRESIDENT: Senator Whitney will you yield to a question.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Yes, very happily.

SENATOR MARSH: Senator Whitney, I have a mystery and that is that there is a name which is missing from letters which were given to the committee in opposition to Senator Anderson. I saw the letter handed in, since it was shown to me first before it was handed in and I'm wondering where that letter might be. It was signed by Dr. B. Morris, who is a psychologist, and I'm wondering where the list of that might be.

SENATOR WHITNEY: A, Senator Marsh, if my secretary has made an error, it was an honest mistake. I specifically gave directions that we should put down everybody who came and spoke in favor of, everybody who wished to leave a message and to sign the roster, everybody who couldn't speak, but didn't have a message to sign the roster, both for and against, and if this is the case, I'd be very happy to have you tell what this particular individual had to say. It if it's that way, it's an honest error, my, our secretary and I think she would feel very bad, about it. If she knew that it was not in there.

SENATOR MARSH: Dr. Whitney, I'm not in a position to speak for another individual, on this, except this information I was aware of since the letter was shown to me directly before it was handed in on the day of the 2nd, hearing. So this was the day that letter was handed in and you may be able to check on it for me please.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Yes, I would be very happy to.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Frank Lewis. Incidentally the Chair perhaps should clarify for the body, in order to help you debate this issue, that the sole thing before the body, is the confirmation of Dr. Jack Anderson for the position of Director of the Department of Public Institutions. Now I want to remind you that's the sole issue before the body.
