SENATOR DUIS: Fine, why don't you do this then. Why don't you require them to put postage on it. Why don't you amend it instead of opposing it?

SENATOR MARESH: I think that would be alright.

SENATOR DUIS: Please make your amendment. I would appreciate it.

SENATOR MARESH: I would amend the rule change to include that organizations putting these in our mailboxes be required to put postage on this mail.

SENATOR DUIS: I don't know who's going to cancel this postage but it's going to be a pretty good idea.

SPEAKER: Well, we have an amendment to the amendment. Senator Maresh amendment, as the Chair understands it is that if you deliver this material to the postmistress, it must have postage on it. Senator Lewis?

SENATOR LEWIS: Mr. Chairman, I rise to oppose that, particularly if we're talking about mail, internal mail from state agency to state agency thus paying for stamps to get information down here from somebody else. I think we're criticized for enough things. That would add to the camping of it, unless we want to do something to create a first class post office here and I understand that's helpful for appointments but that, that's ridiculous.
