SENATOR GOODRICH: Ok, then you're...really what you are doing is you're increasing the fee on multiple request for abstracts. Right.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Right. Now, see this was agreed to in the original amendment on single...on groups of ten, \$7.50 for groups of ten or more and we had it in the original amendment, \$1.00 on singles but there are very, very few single abstracts received. Most of them are groups of ten or more. The insurance companies might order a hundred of them at one time, so from this standpoint there is very little fiscal impact on the dollars and cents by just having it at \$1.00. There is very few single abstracts gotten..

SENATOR GOODRICH. OK.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: So, what we were...what the main thing we were interested in is keeping the figure down where it is not a revenue producing program, but a program that will pay for the computerization which Abe's Insurance Companies, they agreed that the service to them they should pay for it. Now, the only other thing on this, Senator Goodrich, is the fifty percent of the seventy-five cents. The original was 45% of the 75¢, and 25% of the \$1.00, and that did produce around \$110,000. This will produce \$103,000.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Your present (inaudible)

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: I don't...now, the insurance companies agree to this. This is their amendment.

SENATOR GOODRICH: I don't care what the insurance...excuse me, I don't care what the insurance companies (inaudible)

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Well, it depends on whether you want it (inaudible)

PRESIDENT: Gentlemen, let's not carry on a dialogue on the floor. Let's ask questions and then let somebody answer, but let's not carry on a dialogue. You can't transcribe it and it confuses the body. Please.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: This has never been a revenue producing program and it shouldn't be, and all this does is assure us of a computerization program in the Department of Motor Vehicles for insurance purposes, for drivers license abstracts.

SENATOR GOODRICH: All right. Now, let's try to get just the totals. What do the fiscal analyst say that your amended form of the bill will produce in revenue compared to what it produces now. What does it produce now? Apparently, it is \$110,000 income. Now, what was your form of the bill produce.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Well, let's see, real quickly. There is about 280,000 abstracts and, say, \$3.50 or 35¢ per abstract. So, you are going from 35¢ per abstract on 280,000 abstracts. Now, this is total. 35¢ for ten or more abstracts.

PRESIDENT: I suppose the chair should inquire if you still want to lay this bill over and look at it, if that is going to help things, or if you want to go ahead and thrash it out now.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Well, I don't think it will help but I am willing to, if that is the case.

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich, do you want to prolong the discussion here, or do you want to lay the bill over.

SENATOR GOODRICH: I think it would be prudent to lay it over, unless Senator Richendifer and I'd get together.
