SENATOR STAMMER: Well then I would like to add that perhaps this raises the point Senator Chambers made, here we are dealing in interstate commerce and I would wonder what kind of problems we might be getting in to. I wonder if you would consider perhaps discussing this both with the dentists and the Attorney General to see especially if it pertains to interstate commerce, what we would be getting into and perhaps then offer an amendment on select file, when you get some answers concerning this interstate commerce?

PRESIDENT: Senator Carstens do you care to respond?

SENATOR CARSTENS: No I have no objection if somebody wants to do it, I have no objections.

PRESIDENT: Well, Senator Carpenter, we still have the Carstens' amendment before the body. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I would object to the amendment to be put on select file, that is quite difficult, if we are going to have an amendment when we get through what we are doing now, let's hold it on general file, and then let nature take it's course as the amendments appear, you get it on select file your pretty much dead.

PRESIDENT: Well, what's your pleasure Gentlemen? Are you all through debating the issue, the Carstens amendment? Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. President and members of the legislature, I'd object to putting it on select file, or putting the amendment on select file and I think that the amendment should be considered now, and disposed of.

PRESIDENT: Alright, any further discussion now of the Carsten amendment to 449. Senator Carsten do you want to close on your amendment? Alright, the question is shall, the question is shall the Carsten amendment to 449 be adopted, all those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Senator Carpenter asking for a record vote on the amendment. Voting on the Carsten amendment which has deleted the word milk now to LB 449. The Chair would ask if you have all voted? The Clerk will record.

CLERK: Vote read. 9 ayes, 20 nays, 20 not voting.

PRESIDENT: The motion is defeated and the amendment is lost. We are back now to, are there other amendments to the bill?

CLERK: Yes.

PRESIDENT: Alright.

CLERK: Read.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Richard Lewis for his amendment here to LB 449.

SENATOR LEWIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the legislature, I've felt all along that this was the move for the local governing boards to hide behind the legislature, because presently if they want to go to a referendum of the people, they can put this before the people and if the majority of those people want this it can be voted in now, it doesn't take an act of the legislature, so I'm going to shift the responsibility by this amendment and this puts the sole authority
