SENATOR STROMER: Mr. President, and fellow Senators. I too have a student assistant, and I do not object to having some of the restrictions placed on, I have one of the students from Wesleyan University and I do find them very helpful, and I do think they gain something from a learning experience, but I also think that if we get to the point where we might have 49 students sitting underneath these balconies or on, to the floor, we could become over run to the point that we couldn't even get our own work done. I think that we can't maybe consider what is just now, or what is just convenient for us at the time, but what is going to be necessary for the long run. Now at the present time we have chosen in this body not to change this particular rule, in any way, so consequently we have been operating with the present rule including with student assistants, so consequently I think we should also defeat the Marsh amendment and let the rule stand as it is, because this seems to have been the decision of the body, and operate as we have been operating, and I think that is how we should continue with this particular rule and defeat the Marsh amendment.
