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regulations would be and if we don't line them up with the Feds we just hurt ourselves, we hurt everybody in this state when we don't do that. Now please, please, don't mess this thing up, let's keep it the way it should be, so that the state will be orderly.

SPEAKER: Senator Kelly I believe that when a division of the question is called for that it's mandatory, that it be done that way so I believe we are going to have to take it paragraph by paragraph, we may then have to vote on the amendment as a whole, but we will take that when we come to it. Now I would ask Senator Maresh we are on paragraph one is that right, Senator Maresh?

SENATOR MARESH: Yes.

SPEAKER: Alright, now will you just explain to the body briefly what this involves so that we can put this into focus properly, we'll go to paragraph one now.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President and members of the legislature, the first amendment has to do with the one that Senator Chambers did not object to, has to do with the hotel, motel managers that receive part of their pay in board and room. I move that this amendment be adopted. This is on page 2, line 21 and 22, we reinstated this material which was stricken in the bill.

SPEAKER: Alright, is there any further discussion? Senator Chambers were you asking for the floor? Is everybody ready for the question? Now the, I'm going to have a machine vote on these because it seems that there is controversy and I don't want to trust my ear. All those in favor of the committee amendment number 1, vote aye, those opposed vote no. Have you all voted? The Clerk will record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 1 nay.

SPEAKER: The amendment passes, and now Senator Maresh, will go to paragraph two and will you briefly explain what that is.

SENATOR MARESH: The next amendment is on page 3, line 4, 5 and 6. This has to do with students, this is reinstating them to be exempt to reinstate the stricken matter in the bill, students regulating, enrolled in primary and secondary schools, working after school hours and vacation, this includes grade children and high school children and I would like to call your attention to a letter I received that pertains to students and can I talk on this now, Mr. Speaker?

SPEAKER: Yes, you are explaining what it is, Senator Chambers can of course rebut if he so desires.

SENATOR MARESH: We received a letter from a man that owns several theaters in Beatrice, Fairbury and Hebron, and also some bowling alleys and he said that he would have to go to mechanized equipment if we would raise the wages of the children, that work after school hours and I think after we took this into light when we amended the bill that this would in fact hurt some of the people that we would like to help, by raising the minimum wage and these people would put mechanized dispensers in the theaters and they would not employ these school children. I move that this amendment be adopted.

SPEAKER: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the legislature, I'm very emotionally involved in this bill, and on issues where I'm very emotionally involved, I try to be as calm and deliberative
