

type of thing but these private enterprise people which I believe in really and some of the rest of you do not really, you talk about it but you're the first to vote for legislation in here, the first to introduce legislation to make a minimum price on milk to protect the dairymen or something like that and I just think, say right now, I'm going to vote for this bill--Senator Chambers side right now because I'll discontinue setting minimum wages and I think they're awful low. When you fellows in here discontinue setting minimum prices. Now there is no difference. The only difference is that one goes to the worker and the other goes into the industrialist or commercial or the farmers' pocket. That alright. You see these things to--through two different types of glasses. One of them is dark glass and the other one is very light. You see it only on the way to your pocket. You don't see it to the employee's pocket.

SPEAKER: Senator Simpson.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature. I oppose the amendment number 2 also. I think we find that talking about inexperienced people that we hire a lot of inexperienced people here even. You're their employers and we don't pay them this low a wage or try to knock them out of this section. Students, it looks to me what you're trying to do to the students, if they need the money, it says they have to be regularly enrolled in school in order to be in this classification so as soon as they're able, they just drop out of school then they can draw the money. I think we should be encouraging them to stay in school by seeing that they get the amount of money necessary while they're school children so that they can continue.

SPEAKER: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, Mr. President, these are the kind of bills that encourage labor unions to organize people. Now let's look at some of the things we've done for industry so to speak. We passed a bill which exempts from personal property and that's about the only place that affects inventory, business, 12½% a year, \$7,000,000 a year. I multiplies 12½ each succeeding year so when we get all through, we're going to exempt about 60 to \$70,000,000 in taxes. These people who are opposed, they think that's alright and I can understand that. I can understand that. Then the other area, for example, in taxation anybody that knows anything about taxation knows that in a general sense, the people coming down to this body to oppose these bills, they're the ones who don't pay what the law says, first because they legally avoid and because we give them all the advantages in order to do that and bring it about. The law on supply and demand, ha ha, my friends, the law on supply and demand insofar as farmers is concerned. If you had to live on that, you'd been on a starvation diet a long time ago. You been subsidized every year of your life by the Federal Government and rightfully so. You get minimum payments, for example, and they've stayed up to \$100 and some thousand dollars a year on a farm. Let's look at what's going on now for example. We have the Republican party who is limited the price that meat can go up. Without any restriction, meat should, should and would go to \$5 up, \$50 a hundred. Let's take Senator Maresh, he's concerned about those moving picture people and I cry for them too every day. I used to own one of them. The only difference, when I ran one I got .50¢ a person, today you get \$1.50 to \$2.00 and they laugh all the way to the bank because they take kids, really in diapers and about all they get is they look at the show and what a show they show. Yes, Senator Maresh, I can understand how you cry for that little moving picture man and I can understand about the man in the bowling alley. If he doesn't have automatic pinsetters now, he really ought to be out of business.
