SPEAKER: Any further discussion? Are you ready for the question? The question is shall the bill as amended be advanced. All those in favor vote aye. Those opposed vote no. The clerk will record.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 1 nay.

SPEAKER: The bill is advanced. LB 340. Senator Keyes. The clerk will read.

CLERK: Read title. LB 340. There are extensive amendments, Mr. President. The first ones are offered by Senator Chambers Government, Military, and Veterans Affairs Committee.

SPEAKER: Mr. Clerk, pardon me. Senator Duis has been asking for the floor and I overlooked him. Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Yes, and I feel real bad. Gentleman, this is your friendly chairman of the Rules Committee. If you will note that new Rule Books were passed out to you this morning. These will be up to date until with what took place yesterday, so I would suggest if you might take from the Journal the Rules that were passed and correct your books and you will be in line for a short time until we have the next hearing. And again, I certainly do commend Vince for putting it in such lovely paper and the yellow, I am sure, will bring it to your attention so that we will have great attention to the Rules and if you will just get a red marking pencil now, you will be able to mark those which you like the best and can use the most.

SPEAKER: Thank you very much, Senator Duis.

CLERK: Mr. President, there are Keyes amendments to the Standing Committee amendments which Senator Keyes has offered.

SPEAKER: Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, and Senator Duis, the Rules that we don't like we will just ignore anyhow, or suspend them. Mr. President, this is a bill that was given to me by the people that work for state government and there seems to be a great deal of...well, let's take the amendments first. We have offered a set of amendments here and at the end of the first section on Page 28, I went down to Mr. Peters who works for the Department of Personnel and told him to put it in statute, in legal form, what we would like to do and, so, this just simply puts into legal technology what we are going to do and how they are going to operate the Department. I make a motion that we accept these amendments.

SPEAKER: Is there any further discussion? Have you finished explaining your amendment, Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, these amendments are given to me by Mr. Peters of the Department who told me that this would make it far better than what the Standing Committee amendments were.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion? Are you ready for the question? All those in favor of the Keyes amendment say aye. Those opposed no. Amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Well, now, it is my understanding that those were amendments to the Standing Committee amendments, not in lieu of.
