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If we allocate the money for the trust funds into a sales tax reduction, that is going to mean a loss of further trust funds for us because when monies are utilized for tax reductions the Government takes in account your tax effort and there will be less Revenue coming. If that is what the body wants that is alright with me. I prefer the alternative of just bracketing the trust funds and studying them and not expending them on anything until this time next year. Whatever is in the Governor's budget is more than adequate to run every agency until we get back here next January and if there is any overages or underages, we can adopt them at the time but I think some of us who have worked hard on trying to come up with what we think are constructive suggestions for changes are a little tired of being nit-picked at. So, I say, in spite of the fact we are going to cut back Voc-Tech Schools two million dollars, in spite of the fact that two years ago we said we only needed two million for sewers, we gave him six and he spent six and a quarter. I say let's give him his budget and see what happens.

PRESIDENT: The chair next recognizes Senator Simpson, then Keyes, Duis, Savage, Nore.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I, too, will support the Carpenter motion. I think that we this morning were given the prerogative by the Governor to go along and so, in that way, reduce taxes or to go ahead and do what the Budget Committee is thinking is necessary for the state. We have many programs which I, personally, feel are going to be hurt but I listened to the Governor say he is willing to hurt those programs and if he is willing to go ahead and take the brunt of the attack, all for a minor reduction of their taxes which will be the miracle of the century, then, I will support him and we will see what he does.

PRESIDENT: Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. President, I am going to support Senator Carpenter's motion this morning for two or three reasons. In a line with the same thinking that Senator Burbach gained when he was back in Washington, I was on the other coast listening to one of the Federal men talk and the feeling seemed to be from that Federal employee that the Government of the United States was going to use the increased production on the farms this year to beat down the prices so that the price of food that the consumer was going to consume was down. Now, this only means one thing. The property owners, the home owners, and farms, and ranches throughout this state, if this becomes a reality, are going to be able to pay less taxes than they can today. So, if we are going to go in and spend 25, or 30, or 40 million dollars of money that we are expecting these people to raise when the Federal government is coming along and by their very policy are going to cut my income, then I am not in favor of increasing them. You probably know that there is one bill that I am very interested in down here and I have told the Governor that if he would finance education out of a special appropriation, we could cut the mill levy or the sales tax at 2% and the income tax down to 10. The present bill that has come before this house, I'll guarantee you that the people in Papillion can do a lot better by paying 2% sales tax and 10% income tax than they can by paying 4½% sales tax and about 28 or 30% income tax. They will be far better off and if we can live within this, fine. I would suggest that we go home when we get the bills across the floor that need that one..that need to be. Go home, and if the Governor of this state needs us to get back into session, I will
