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saying is that we shall compound the problem and include every conceivable agency that we've got in State government in this prohibition of appropriation of deficiency funds so that no one gets bailed out. I personally frankly think that we took a rather rash, ill-conceived course of action this morning that we are going to live to regret and I personally would oppose any kind of a move like this that would compound the problem.

SENATOR SYAS: I don't think, Senator in answer, if that was a question instead of a speech, I don't know, but if it was a question, I'll answer you this way. In the first place I don't think we're compounding it. Second place because I think all we're doing in this motion is to urge the Governor to recognize and not introduce that, such a bill. That doesn't prevent him from introducing a bill and of course naturally he would introduce a bill but when he does introduce these deficit spending bills I want him to take full responsibility of it which he hasn't been doing and I think it's about time he does. I can't really cry, Senator Goodrich, with what the majority of the Legislature did this morning. If someone, if the Governor dared us, the way I look at it, to do what the majority did, we accepted the challenge and maybe it's the best thing that ever happened. To Senator Mahoney, I'll have you know that I had this motion on the desk this morning, not this afternoon, it just so happened we didn't get to it until this afternoon.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. President, I'd just like to point out to Senator Goodrich that apparently the courts have the rights to make expenditures anyway because they started paying Dunlevey and some other people even though the appropriation wasn't yet ready to go so we didn't know it before but apparently the courts have the ability to spend monies even without the approval of the Legislature so I guess there's no great problem there.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion now on the motion? Are you all through discussing Senator Syas' motion? Read the motion, please.

CLERK: Reads.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the motion now? All right, Senator Syas. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: You mean we're just urging him to do it? Just tell him not to do it, we won't give him a deficit appropriation. That's what I want to amend it to.

PRESIDENT: I didn't hear your amendment, Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I want to move to notify the Governor that we will not grant any deficit appropriations beyond what he has asked for. He says he can do it, I think he ought to do it. If he can't, call us back. We took him at his word.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion now of Senator Carpenter's amendment to the motion? Senator Chambers. We're discussing now the amendment which would be to notify the Governor about the deficit expenditures.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I think both motions--Senator Syas' original motion and the amendment should be defeated and I think this entire discussion between the Governor and the Legislature at long distance should be terminated. The action that the Legislature wanted to take was taken this morning. I think now there should be no attempts to influence the Governor at all. If the Legislature
