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does have an A-bill, which we do not need to pass just like Senator Carpenter pointed out the other day. We can pass these bills and as long as we don't pass the A-bill they have no fiscal impact. Plus the fact--

SENATOR MARVEL: Excuse me but that is the issue before the house that we're trying to settle through the Attorney General.

SENATOR WALDRON: Oh I see. Well, what I'd like to point out, that 110 before we adjourn, needs to be read because it implements the Constitutional Amendment from last year and I think Senator Luedtke will back me up on this and the cost is only \$13,000 and that's an exacted probably the same cost that we're presently spending for the present nominating commission. So its not an increase of expenditures. I know its going to be a little difficult to reason with those who are unwilling to listen what, what would be the actual fact in this case. But I would like to have you keep that in mind so when we bring it up sometime later, then you might be more oriented toward the fact that this is, is not going to cost money.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers, for what purpose did you wish to want to be recognized?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I have a question I would like to put it to the chair. Mr. President, the motion under which we're operating today, says that Bills with no fiscal impact will be considered on final reading. Is that correct?

PRESIDENT: That's the chairs understanding.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now when we leave out certain bills, then the ones that we take are not being taken in the order that they appear on the worksheet. Is that correct?

PRESIDENT: A no, it's the chairs understanding that the ones we are taking are on the worksheet and they are eligible to be considered on final reading and even in this instance for instance, they are bracketed for final reading for today.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So there is nothing being done that is, that would require any change in the rules regarding final reading.

PRESIDENT: No, the only thing is if they have just deleted by previous motion those Bills that have fiscal impact as Senator Waldron pointed out regarding 110. Everything else is in order as far as the chair is concerned.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'll talk to you later about the question I have in mind.

PRESIDENT: Thank-you. Once again if we can clear the floor and of course the rules do require that the Senators be in their seats. We will begin final reading. Ok, attention please, the final read- just a minute before we begin that I'd like to introduce a group of International women who are from all over the world and some are visitors, some are Americans and they are come from all of the Lincoln Senators districts and their seated in the south balcony. We're delighted to have them here today to see democracy in action. This is the real test, believe me. We hope you enjoy your visit to the Capitol building and also that you have enjoyed your stay here in the capitol city of Nebraska. The assistant clerk will read LB 22, as provided by the Constitution.

CLERK: LB 22 (READ)

PRESIDENT: At this time the Chair would like to recognize some visitors in the south balcony. We have 39 grade school students from Percival Elementary School, in Percival Iowa,
