Let's give him 259 in the form that he asked for it so that we cannot be criticized to the point where we did not give him the tool with which to do the job that he wanted to do, that he promised to do. You're going to give him an out if you don't return 259 and adopt these specific amendments, you're going to give him an out, the Legislature did it again, and that's what I'm trying to avoid. As far as amending this bill with any other amendments, I would say no. This is not my specific amendment, these are amendments that were requested by the Governor. They are not the same as if I personally were trying to adopt a separate amendment that I thought was proper. These are not as the amendments that any of us would think were proper as far as what we were going to do to change his budget. These are his amendments. For that reason I would suggest we return 259, adopt his amendments, put her back across and vote it
