

never has committed itself that I know to lay over any bill that the fiscal staff says to lay over.

SPEAKER: Yes, Senator I believe the only motion, proper motion now is to take up LB 110. This what you're saying, isn't it, it was merely passed over.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Yes.

SPEAKER: Yes, I think a motion is in order to take up LB 110 and is that your motion, Senator Carstens?

SENATOR CARSTENS: That was the motion that I intended to make because I wasn't sure what the status--

SPEAKER: Well, the Chair rules that's a proper motion--

SENATOR CARSTENS: --and then I will ask also action on 110A. I'm not giving it up but I want to take--

SPEAKER: Well, we'll take them one at a time. We'll take up 110 first. That's a motion to take it up and the Chair rules it requires 25 votes. Now we have a number of lights up here. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Well, Mr. President, I would urge the body not to do this this morning. Obviously the question is where do you stop on other bills which are in a similar position? I don't believe anybody is suggesting that these bills will not be acted upon this session. I think they obviously will but one of the problems that are still being worked on and which has got to be really resolved before some of these bills can be considered which have--may have a future impact, this is not pertaining to 110 but this is the fact that the appropriate language has got to be placed in the statutes which set sales and income tax rates so funding could be provided where there is funding down the road in some of these bills if the Legislature desire to do so and there also has to be probably appropriate language in the authorization legislation as well as in the statutes which sets rates and as I understand, bill drafting is working on the appropriate language and to my knowledge it's not ready yet but it should be ready shortly, but I see no reason to start breaking what was established as the general policy here a few days ago at this point, knowing full well that there's going to be ample opportunity and there certainly is no intention, I'm sure on those of us who would urge not to do this today, to never read these bills. They honestly have to be passed but I don't know that there is the urgency that, that it needs to be done today rather than maybe in a couple of days when it's a little clearer as to what some of these alternatives are. I would hope the Legislature would be willing to move slowly enough that we can be sure of our grounds and yet rapid enough to accomplish the necessary legislation. I see no reason why both of these things cannot be met.

SPEAKER: Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. Chairman and Members of the Legislature. I certainly support Senator Carstens in his efforts to see that the will of the people happens to be implemented. I think we're faced with a number of issues where the people have spoken, they've said we want this job done in this amendment and at least another amendment that I know of that's on the board that's a bill of mine. I think that when we say that we're not going to pass any A bills, when we make that judgment, even though the people of the State have said, this is what we want to do and that's a mandate, that's just not a Roper Pole that maybe some of you have taken over the vacation and then the other thing that disturbs me to no end is the fact
