of the constitutional amendment.

SENATOR SYAS: Right.

SENATOR CARSTENS: It is only for the purpose of the cost involved in changing our judicial nominating system.

SENATOR SYAS: Right, that's exactly what I thought, but I wanted to clear up that misinformation. Thank you.

SPEAKER: Senator Marvel.

SENATOR MARVEL: I would be in hopes that the Legislature would pass over this motion at the moment and so I would ask Senator Carstens, at least for today, to pass over the motion and I'll tell you why. We're going to have an appropriations meeting this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock, can't have one sooner than that because the committee on committees meeting this noon and there are four members of our committee on that committee. What we're going to try to do is to, as rapidly as we can, at least by tomorrow I hope, come up with some sort of capital construction recommendations. Senator Warn--so this will give you as the Legislature a look at a large hunk of money and whether you spend it this way or not is up to you but I think you ought to have the opportunity to look at the hunk of money in two or three categories and then make up your minds and this does not exclude all the other items that we're talking about but I think you ought to look at the big items first and in all respect to Senator Lewis and others, some of us have been around here a while and have seen what happens when we start chipping away and that's no insult on any legislator, that's just the facts of life and that's all we're talking about. Senator Warner has some proposals in regard to the reduction of taxation which will take a substantial sum of money. You ought to take a look at that. Senator Lewis has a bill which I understand comes up tomorrow, 172, which talks about State aid to education, that takes a large hunk of money. I think the first thing we ought to do in fairness to this body and in fairness to the general public when we get down towards the end of the session, is to take a look at the large areas first and when we get through with that, then we can proceed. So, with that in mind, I would like to ask Senator Carstens to withhold his motion until the Legislature's had a chance to look at these three or four major areas. This is not an attempt to stall the end of the session. This is an attempt to try to bring in a more comprehensive total picture of what faces us, what faces the Governor, what faces the general public as a result of what we do between now and the end of this session.

SPEAKER: Senator Carstens.

SENATOR CARSTENS: Mr. President, I, I have no objection but do I understand you correctly, Senator Marvel, are you going to consider in the--your deliberations in the appropriations committee beginning sometime today or tomorrow, are you going to consider this, bills like this?

SENATOR MARVEL: I think what we can do in addition to capital construction, in ad--and Senator Lewis and I had some discussion yesterday in regard to the money that's left to us, at least I consider left to us, we also can bring once again a total picture of the amount of impact of the A bills that face us so we can give you a complete picture either by tomorrow or by the next day.

SENATOR CARSTENS: Well, it, on your assuring that this will be done, I will be willing to withdraw my motion for the time being but I am very--I am very concerned that in previous sessions, we go to a lot of work and a lot of hearings and a
