I'm wondering if you are amending the right section of law. That's the thing that's bothering me.

SENATOR BARNETT: OK, because I think what happened was that they... Emory Burnett changed the whole law because I asked Senator Goodrich the same thing. I mean, he printed the whole section for that one amendment where I thought we could have just changed the 100 to 250.

SENATOR DUIS: Well, that's fine then because I wanted to make sure because the municipalities and anyone investigating have to make this and one of these days I am going to get around to the place where they don't make duplicate deals. In other words, when you have an accident within the city limits, the city is required to file this report and on top of that, the persons involved have to file a report and I am telling you they have more reports than they know what to do with out there.

SENATOR BARNETT: That's OK. I think Senator Richendifer... here is Senator Goodrich now. He could take it and answer your question.

SENATOR DUIS: No, No, but about next session, I am going to try and work it out that anybody that has an accident within a corporate limits where they are required to file this accident report with the accident that that individual doesn't have to do it, too, because they've got more reports over there than you can shake a stick at and I'll bet they really conflict in great shape.

SENATOR BARNETT: All this does is to comply with the bill that Senator Fowler passed earlier in this session raising the insurance reporting from 100 to 250. I move for the adoption of that amendment.

SPEAKER: Is there any further discussion? Senator Goodrich, do you want to close. Senator Goodrich has waived closing on his motion. All those in favor of the amendment say aye. Those opposed no. The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: We have another amendment offered by Senator Barnett. Read amendment.

SENATOR BARNETT: I move the adoption of this amendment. The reason for this amendment is yesterday when you adopted the "right turn" amendment, our legal help Stu Weaver and Senator Fowler found that it needed clarification in a further line, in a second or third line, so this just complies with the "right turn" law that you adopted for the state of Nebraska yesterday to clear up the "right turn" section. I move for the adoption of that.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion? If not, are you ready for the question? All those in favor of the Barnett amendment say aye. Those opposed no. The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: All right. Now, Mr. President, I have an amendment by Senator Carpenter to amend the Standing Committee amendments. Read amendment.
