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Especially in many States, they use it quite a bit. I understand in California, it's used to a great deal on law enforcement, and the fact is, it's not only used for traffic, but I think it's used for many other things, and I've heard lately it's used the reverse way. I've heard that some people can fly over a hog yard and find out what to steal that night. So I guess it's we use both ways, but we do have to consider on an amendment of this nature, what are you going to do with the enforcement that flies in the sky.

SPEAKER: The chair at this time, wishes to recognize Mrs. Robinson who's the wife of our Assistant Sargent at Arms, on their, who is now visiting the Legislature and this is on their 55th Wedding Anniversary. Would Mrs. Robinson please stand, and the chair would like to recognize 11 students in the sixth grade from Beattie School, Lincoln Nebraska. Mrs. Pratt their teacher, Senator Fowler, their Senator. They are in the north balcony. We're very happy to have you students here today. We have Senator Proud, Senator Duis, Senator Kremer, who wishes to speak I'd like to have the clerk read the amendment that we're discussing, so that we will be discussing only the amendment.

CLERK: Amendment (Read)

SPEAKER: Senator Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Well Mr. President, first of all, I would like to ask Senator Carpenter, I think he alluded to this, but how this happened to occur to him in the first place. He made some mention about a nest of patrol cars or something.

SPEAKER: Senator Carpenter will you yield?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Certainly. Now if you'll go back in the records this is not a new idea to me, I have attempted it a number of times previously in sustance to the same amendment. We called it to my attention was last Saturday when I was driving with another person from Grand Island to Lincoln. In which I found as I recall, 5 highway Patrol cars which were located on the low side of a hill which precluded those going that direction from seeing they were there. They were very busy during the time that we passed stopping people who were apparently exceeding the speed limit. That reactivid, reactivated my appetite to again to attempt to do the thing that a number of times I was not sucessful in doing and this bill happened to be the be the vehicle which it might be done.

SENATOR PROUD: Senator Carpenter suggests that people have different theories about this, but I believe I'll vote against the amendment for these reasons, it seems to me that this introduces a new theory in criminal law, and that new theory is that in order to commit a crime, you must, the arresting officer must be within visible distance. Now thats seemingly is what this is really all about. Now of course nobody knows what visible, clearly visible means, I believe it says the patrol car must be clearly visible. To me that represents the defense attorneys dream, because every time anybody wants to resist, they would say well the car wasn't clearly visible. So you'd have to prove whether or not it was clearly visible. Now whether it's clearly visible or not, I suppose depends on your eye sight. If your half blind, it's won't be very visible. If you have 20/20 vision, then perhaps it's visible. So this presents all kinds of problems as far as enforcing the law is concerned and it seems to me, it's the perfect out for anybody who wants to get a traffic speeding charge, dismissed. It has also occurred to me that and I am certainly am not accusing Senator Carpenter of this, he, he apparently was not speeding, but it seems to me that it always, many times, it's the offenders. The violators of the law, who want legislation passed so they can't be caught. It seems to me that to adopt this amendment would create a speeders paradise because all you've got to do is look down the road and if you don't see a patrol car, you can go as fast
