

SPEAKER: Senator Kremer, did you wish to speak on the amendment to the amendment? Senator Kime, on the amendment to the amendment? Senator Chambers, on the amendment to the amendment? Stahmer, on the amendment to the amendment? Nore, on the amendment to the amendment?

SENATOR NORE: Mr. Chairman and members, Senator Duis recommended patrolmen every 20 miles and I wonder what the fiscal impact of that would be? We have 5,559 miles of primary roads and we have 3,790 secondary roads, 431 Interstates for a total of 10,000 miles roughly. That would take 1,000 patrolmen just out on the highways. Now Senator Duis, would you be willing to go along with the fiscal impact on this kind of a program?

SENATOR DUIS: Senator Nore, you misunderstood me. I talked about the Interstate and if this would occur on the Interstate we could reduce the number of patrolmen tremendously on the Interstate because the Interstate is only some 400 and some miles long. Now you didn't follow me very closely when I was making my statement. I talked about the Interstate Highway.

SENATOR NORE: What about the others then?

SENATOR DUIS: I made no remark in regard to those, I was merely expounding a theory that if you have one mark every 20 miles crossways they would not be using gasoline, sir, and if they change places every hour they would patrol the entire Interstate every hour with only a 20-mile drive.

SPEAKER: Chair recognizes Senator Simpson.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I think maybe Senator Lewis is a little behind in that we now have all kinds of cars on the highway the same color as the Highway Patrol. Practically any car you see maybe the same color as a patrol car because the patrol is now using all different colors and so maybe your amendment really has no fact.

SPEAKER: Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I wonder if Senator Lewis would yield to a question?

SPEAKER: Senator Lewis.

SENATOR MARESH: Do you know how many cars there are, state cars?

SENATOR F. LEWIS: I'm afraid to guess.

SENATOR MARESH: Guess.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: I don't know but I would suspect there are probably, I can't even estimate it. If it's like some of our other procedures I'm sure there would be plenty to get on the highways.

SENATOR MARESH: 5329 cars.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: How many?

SENATOR MARESH: 5329 cars.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: That's not too bad.

SENATOR MARESH: So, I wonder if you don't mean they should have red lights on them or...

SENATOR F. LEWIS: No, you know in all seriousness, this is not a new proposal just for this state. There are experiences where people have done the same thing. I understand what Senator
