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Simpson says, they basically have two colors of cars, the blue and I think some kind of an amber color but there's nothing wrong with when we've replaced cars, to take those cars and put a state emblem on it. Do the same thing for no additional cost. It's a legitimate proposal, maybe, and if we've got 5300 we ought to cover most of the state. I suspect we'll be heavy in Lincoln but...

SPEAKER: Any more discussion? If not, I think we'll take a machine vote on this. Those in favor.. will the Clerk read the motion again, please?

CLERK: I move to amend the Carpenter motion by inserting that "all State cars shall be painted the same as patrol cars". Signed, Senator Frank Lewis.

SPEAKER: Those in favor of the motion vote aye, those opposed vote nay. Senator Whitney voting nay. Have you all voted? Clerk will record the vote.

CLERK: (inaudible)

SPEAKER: The amendment fails. The chair now recognizes Senator Kremer, then Kime, Chambers, Stahmer and Nore.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman, only to say I would support the Carpenter amendment if we could have enough patrolmen out to do the job. Now the thing that slows me up is that I'm conscious of the fact there could be radar and that only because there's not, sometimes I come down from Aurora every day and you do not see one patrolman. Now then I think I can probably go on and say what I want to say by hitchhiking what Senator Chambers reminds us of continually and that is, if you throw a rock into a crowd, the only one that hollers is the guy that gets hit. So I'm just hitchhiking on your philosophy, Senator Chambers. Having said that, I think we discussed this long enough. This bill is a lengthy bill, we've got a lot to do. After those that have indicated they wish to speak, I move the previous question.

SPEAKER: Senator Kime.

SENATOR KIME: Well, Mr. Chairman, members of the body, I can't support this amendment. I don't think, there's no need for the patrol to hide their cars. They can check your speed coming or going any time. If they are coming to meet you they can check your speed with this radar that they have. They don't, they don't have to hide and I don't think the Legislature should try to writethe rules for this organization. They have their own methods, they have their own rules and it's up to them to follow those rules and make their own regulations.

SPEAKER: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I have to respond for a moment to what Senator Proud said and it will be my final comment on this amendment. My support of the amendment is not based on being anti-cop. As a matter of fact, I think I have more letters than Senator Proud from members of the Highway Patrol praising me for my support of law and order. Now, Senator Proud is not a law enforcement official so he can't speak for all of them. This amendment is designed to bring about a prevention of speeding. That can best be done by having the preventative measure clearly visible where people will be aware of it at all times. I think that the Police do not need to hide to enforce traffic regulations and I think that Senator Carpenter's motion ought to be accepted.
