

resolved is if this body does it. On one side, we got people who don't want to resolve anything because they want the status quo. They don't want any bill passed, because they want to leave it like it was. The other people want to change it, and obviously they are never going to agree until we make them agree by out decision to take on this responsibility and pass some kind of a bill. It is just that simple. It is the normal thing to postpone, to procrastinate and to study so you won't do anything. Now this bill has been a long time and a number of times, getting to this point. It would seem to me that today is the time to settle it. Those people who are opposed to this bill, don't want any bill in any form, under any consideration or under any condition. They are satisfied with what they got and they want to keep it that way and the other people are dissatisfied which says until we stop it ourselves, it won't be solved, and to put it to January 1, 1974 or any other future date, we're going to be then just exactly where we are today, and I say to these Senators you'd better learn to compromise. When you get a part of what you want, you've better take it. Ordinarily when you vote for the brass ring, you fall off in the horse, and you break your arm. There's always a time to do things, there's always a time to study and this is not the time to study anymore, because this body will never know anymore about the intricacies of banking and those today. We only know, we have a conflict of interest. We have a problem that ought to be solved. We know beyond a question of doubt that the people, that the people of this State are demanding not additional banking services as a loan, but their demanding the additional services of making deposits and making change in the area where the traffic is and they always bring up this bug-a-boo, branch banking. That is the only thing they can hang their hat on and most of the people complain about it, already have it and they want to maintain that status quo too. Now this bill is only the interest of the general public by the creation of shopping centers and other like facilities. They want to go where people are. They don't want to go all over the town, in order to find a place to make a deposit, go to a parking lot. This is our way of life and these deposits for example, they have now mechanisms now, they make change, they take deposits, they do everything except talk to you. That is the world you live in. It is a computerized citizenship and a computerized business. We ought to determine and settle this, we might as well settle it now. If Schmidts got the votes and their unwilling to compromise, then we ought to see if we can't ride over them. It is just that simple. They don't have enough sense to compromise, then we ought to ride over them.

SPEAKER: Clerk will you read the motion, so we're sure everybody understands.

CLERK: The motion reads to bracket Legislative bill 312, on general file until January 10, 1974, signed Senator Lewis.

SENATOR ANDERSON: Mr. President, members of the body, I think that Senator Lewis has suggested a solution here which will put the bankers in a position where a majority of them will arrive at a solution that will be acceptable to them. I think that if we leave this bill where it is, we are saying to them, that you are going to have to work out a compromise and if you don't, then a solution will be made, but I think the dimension solution has been suggested. I think they can be worked out, I think this would be a wise course of action to adopt Senator Lewis's amendment, a Senator Lewis's suggestion.
