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then it can loan a certain percentage of its deposits out to the public. To the people in that area and if we let the savings and loan association come in, any number that want to, theres two trying to come into Papillion, a local and then one out of Omaha, but if we let these people come in and absorb all of the loose money and not let the bank offer its facilities, and able to serve that community, we're simply going to say to the banker that is there, you have a limited amount of money that you can service these small farms that Senator Nore speaks so well of. Their going to be limited in their capitol that they can have, and they will not be able to lend out the money. So if we are going to try to ham string banking in the State of Nebraska, then let's go ahead and do that and let's do the same thing with the savings and loan association. I'm sick and tired of hearing people complain about offering to the people a service on one hand and then taking it away from them on the other. That is all I have to say about it.

**SPEAKER:** Senator Schmidt.

**SENATOR SCHMIDT:** Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I agree with both that has been said here this morning and I think that we have to again to attempt to try to compromise the issue. I, I don't think that the 3 mile limit is, is necessarily a good amendment, but I would, I would support the amendment and hope that if the amendment is adopted, the bill is advanced on general file, then if these people who are so interested in compromise, want to compromise and discuss the issue further, we can take a hold of it we have several days time in which we can work on it and to prove that my good faith, I would be willing to do that. Now I'd like to comment a little further and I think that Senator Carpenter raised a very valid point. The one bank town has killed more communities in this State than any other institution in the State of Nebraska and if these institutions really want to do something for the State of Nebraska, they'll get off dead center and come out of the wood work, and let us know how they feel about this amendment. Senator Nore speaks about the small family size farm and it takes him several, quite a little while to drive across his, there isn't any such thing any more. The small family size farm is a thing of the past in most cases. I pointed out because we did not have kind of credit facilities we needed, when we needed them. We have these young men working for large farmers and large institutions now, because no one had the guts to loan them the money to buy the land they needed, when it was available. 20 years ago, you could have bought the best land in the Platte valley for \$200.00 a acre, and every banker I talked to said, no it is too high. Today it is \$1,000 an acre and they say it is too high, but most of the bankers bought land every change they got. Today they are renting it for \$55,00 an acre cash rent, and they are keeping these young men down on the farm because they know they are the best source of labor available. I don't know want to go over the whole issue, we've thrashed around long enough. I accept the amendment, and I hope that those of you who have supported me, I want to thank-you. I want to thank all the men who have taken part here and I hope that those of you that have opposed the bill, if you have serious reservations, will if the bill moves off general file and I hope it will, sit down with me and see if we can attempt to find a common meeting ground. Thank-you.

**SPEAKER:** Senator Nore, did you wish the floor, he passes, Senator Dickinson Whitney, and Duis. Senator Dickinson.

**SENATOR DICKINSON:** Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I wonder if I could ask Senator Schmit a question?

**SENATOR SCHMIT:** Yes.

**SENATOR DICKINSON:** There seems to be a lot going on this morning, and I've missed some of this discussion Senator Schmit, but I just now heard you talking. I'd like to ask exactly what, whats the service these detach facilities are will be allowed to offer, at your bill?
