

SPEAKER: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. President, I'd like to move that we recess for 15 minutes. Now the reason for that. We have a lot of people in the balcony or outside who have a vested interest in this thing and people who listen to other people in the area of lobbyists which is the usual thing, I think it would do all of us who have those people here to go back and see if we can arrive at the practical thing to do. We're all trying to accomplish something. I think it would be 15 minutes well wasted and I so move we recess for 15 minutes.

SPEAKER: Well now, hold the phone. Senator Barnett has a motion here to reconsider. The rules provide that a motion to reconsider takes precedence over all other motions except the motion to adjourn. Now in the spirit of harmony, and good will, Senator Barnett, what do you think about Senator Carpenter's suggestion?

SENATOR BARNETT: It sounds like a real good suggestion to me.

SPEAKER: Senator Duis, what do you think about it?

SENATOR DUIS: I think it's an excellent suggestion. I just wanted to get a little bit of levity in here at the present time. Senator Syas, my holes in the head are better than having holes some place else. We can have a bit of jest about this because I know that you didn't mean what you said, but I think Senator Carpenter has a good idea and I would also second the motion.

SPEAKER: Well, does anybody object to recessing for 15 minutes? Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. Speaker, I think this is a good idea but I hope that you will take these figures that Senator Marvel has presented.

SPEAKER: Well before we do that, we stand--Senator Warner.

SENATOR NORE: I'm not through.

SPEAKER: Pardon me, Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: These figures that Senator Marvel presented are based on these, these revenues are based on the disastrous inflationary economy which we've had the last couple of years. We might not have that. Take that into consideration.

SPEAKER: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, it probably is obviously too late to say what I think needs to be said before the 15 minute recess.

SPEAKER: No, it's never too late. Go ahead.

SENATOR WARNER: But, the first thing, when you--the figures that Senator Marvel submitted are tremendously significant as to what you do or do not do on 172, nor are the alternatives just on each sheet, there are numerous combinations within each sheet, such as sheet 3 indicates the 13% income tax on for the year 1974 which is not necessary and you do not end up with a deficit or the adjusted amount for state aid could be \$15 million rather than \$20 and then you would, based on these projections, end up with an ample reserve on June 30, 1974 so you have no cash flow problems. What I'm suggesting is, and I concur in a recess, is that we don't come back with a snap decision which will not be consistent with what the realistic alternatives we have and I would hope that we would
