

SPEAKER: The amendment is adopted. Senator, what will you do with the bill?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, I move that LB 228 be advanced to E & R for Final.

SPEAKER: Any discussion? All those in favor of advancing the bill say aye. Those opposed no. The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Mr. President, we have an explanation of vote. Read. Signed, Senator Syas. Mr. President, notice of Government Committee executive session, 1 o'clock today, no room. Signed, Senator Chambers. It will be in the East Chamber. Executive session of the Government Committee, 1 o'clock in the East Chamber. Signed, Senator Chambers, Chairman. Mr. President, I ask unanimous consent--read. CLERK: 111 and 366 at the top of General File.
