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and leasing space and I don't have a total here, however.

SENATOR EPKE: Are they all housed separately now, in separate buildings...

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I'll give you, we have the Revenue Department at 316 Executive Building, Welfare at 3020 Leavenworth, Motor Vehicles at 24th and O Street and so on and so forth, through each of these services that are presently provided here.

SENATOR EPKE: But they are now all in separate buildings and scattered?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Yes, well you can tell by those addresses you know, in quite diverse locations throughout the city.

SENATOR EPKE: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Waldron.

SENATOR WALDRON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I rise to support this resolution. I think not only does it apply in the area of Omaha but it also applies in many towns outstate where state office buildings or state services are set up and I think these could be consolidated in many cases with a cost savings into one building and make it more convenient for the people in those areas also. And as far as what effect this will have, of course it will have no effect because the Governor can do it or not do it as he sees fit now but I think it would put us on record as generally favoring this concept which, and I think this body should be involved in that to express our combined opinion to the Governor that we favor this concept and then I think he would be more encouraged to go ahead and do this.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Clark, then Senator Stahmer, then Senator Mahoney.

SENATOR CLARK: I'd like to ask Senator Cavanaugh a question.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh, do you yield?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Senator Clark, yes.

SENATOR CLARK: Is this to buy the First National Bank building in Omaha?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: It's my understanding that the First National Bank building has been considered in addition to about 8 or 10 other buildings that have been considered. I've talked to both the Governor and Judge Liskey and no determination has been made and up to this point I don't think any formal proposals have been submitted to the State from any particular building but I know that they have investigated at least 15 buildings in the City of Omaha.

SENATOR CLARK: Well, isn't the First National Bank building in Omaha owned by Murdock?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I don't know who it's owned by?

SENATOR CLARK: I'm sure it is. Now I understand what they're trying to do is buy this and have a lot of extra space in that particular building. I don't know why Murdock has anything to do with this but he seems to have something to do with all buildings leased to the state for some reason. But he's going to have a lot of extra space and he's going to rent it out, I understand, and I'm certainly not in favor of the State of Nebraska renting out space to anyone. If they've got just enough space to consolidate, fine. But I'd certainly hate to have two or three or four floors extra in order to rent out to
