SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Snyder, have you checked this bill for Constitutionality, by that I mean, restricting usually when a bill is passed with reference to a certain classification of school districts or city, it has to include all of the cities or districts of that particular size to be Constitutional. Or it's classed special legislation. Now when I was interested in the city council by districts, I phrased the question to the Attorney General with reference to a city having the whole rule charter. He said that if you put that qualifying statement in it, it would not be Constitutional. It would have to say all cities of metropolitan class and since Omaha happened to be the only one, naturally Omaha was the only one affected. Now when you say a class 3 district, found within the confines of a metropolitan size city, have you checked that provision for Constitutionality?

SENATOR SNYDER: A no, Senator I haven't. I was told that the bill was drafted, presented through the Secretary of State's office and it is not by bill. It was not even introduced by me, but that is the best answer I can give you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you primary defender of the bill or maybe so then maybe the other questions are not being asked to the right person.

SENATOR SNYDER: Well, when you say defender, I've, I was asked if I would provide an amendment. I said yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right then, I can ask you these questions. Your are in favor of the caucass concept.

SENATOR SNYDER: I'm saying that if they school district, the populous of a school district wants to use that, I say let them use it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you feel that it would be proper or satisfactory to allow people to caucass all they want to determine what candidates they would run in a primary and then let the people also have an opportunity to register for the primary if they choose to, should they be not selected by a caucass?

SENATOR SNYDER: To go ahead and be on the ballot even though you were not selected by the caucass?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, and let the caucus put its, let the people who want the caucass put it's, let the people who want the caucass for the purpose of selecting an individual who's name would appear on the primary ballot and not wipe out the primary.
