this particular motion takes 25 votes in order to bring the bill back in order to save the cost of reprinting it again because of the action this morning. Senator Carpenter. Thank you, Clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, Mr. President on a motion to reconsider the action.

PRESIDENT: Now do we need a motion to move it on to Final Reading?

CLERK: Now the motion would be to advance it to Final Reading.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Nore. Senator Nore is now moving to advance 435 from Select File to Final Reading, the position it was before. Is there a need for discussion? Question is, shall the bill be advanced to Final Reading? All those in favor of readvancing LB 435 from Select File to Final Reading vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, no nays, 23 not voting.

PRESIDENT: Okay, 435 is advanced to Final Reading. Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. Chairman, I have a little problem with 445A. 445 is on Final Reading, the A-bill is at the bottom of General File. I wonder if I could ask unanimous consent to move that to the top and then move it across? Shouldn't be any controversy to it.

PRESIDENT: Are there objections to moving 445A up for consideration? Any objections? Hearing none, so ordered. Before we take it up, Senator Lewis, the Clerk would like to read in some reports here.

CLERK: Reads reports. That's all, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. Chairman, LB 445 is the appropriation bill for the teacher retirement funds to go with 445 which is on Final Reading. I move it be advanced to E & R Initial.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the bill? Question is, shall LB 445A be advanced from General File to E & R Initial? All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Motion is to advance LB 445A from General File. Have you all voted? Thank you. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, no nays on the motion to advance.

PRESIDENT: Bill is advanced. Senator Chambers, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, to ask a question of the chair and the body. We have 26 people here and I doubt that all of us are of the same mind on most of the issues that will come up so we might just want to be a debating society this afternoon. So unless somebody knew some issues that were totally noncontroversial, I don't see why we would stay here and if there are some issues that are totally noncontroversial maybe we ought to bring those forth because I don't see how we could do anything else.

PRESIDENT: The chair would only concur with part of your observations and secondly that we do have sort of a list of tentative "noncontroversial" bills. Pardon me, we have a
