

they are basically on agreement and many of the suggestions are doing the same thing and so, we need to adopt one or the other.

SENATOR CARPENTER: So, at this point in this discussion, if we adopt yours, that would take care of part of his and your procedure in so far as your recommendations.

SENATOR ANDERSON: Right. If..if we adopt mine, then to make the record straight, we are either going to have to adopt mine as a substitute motion...substitute amendment for the Stahmer amendment or we are going to have to reject the Stahmer amendment, one of the two.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Are you offering your amendment as a substitute to Senator Stahmer's.

SENATOR ANDERSON: The motion that I have on the desk was to offer as a substitute. To strike the Stahmer amendment in total and substitute my amendment.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, if we adopt yours, that, in so far as this body is concerned, if we adopt it we will eliminate the subject in so far as Stahmer's amendment and yours and we only would be subjected to whatever amendments might be pending.

SENATOR ANDERSON: Right.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: All right. Now, Senator Anderson, before you begin your explanation of your amendment, the chair would like the special privilege of introducing some very special visitors that we have today. Escorted by Sue Smith from the Wheat Division Home Econ..Home Economist..excuse me, the Home Economist who is a Home Economist from the Wheat Division and Lois Kiester from the State Department of Agriculture today, we have seated under the south balcony Miss Miriam Diaz from Venezuela, Mrs. Maria Teresa De Lara from El Salvador, Miss Luz Angela Ortiz from Columbia, Miss Elisa Quintana from Venezuela and Legia Restrepo who is the Great Plains Wheat representative from Caracos, Venezuela. I would like to have them stand, please, back there and would you welcome them to the state of Nebraska, please. Thank you. When we are all involved in the production of foodstuffs for feeding the world, that is a common topic and we welcome them here today to pursue that with us. Now, Senator Anderson, we are ready, then, for your explanation of your amendment to LB 286. Go ahead, sir.

SENATOR ANDERSON: Mr. President, do I understand that I need to make a motion to adopt these so that we have a motion that is the possession of the floor, or what procedure are we going to follow now.

PRESIDENT: Well, the chair was trying to get a separate explanation of each one and then we would vote on each one separately and I presume we would have to take a vote on Senator Stahmer's amendment first. Then, we would take a vote on yours because that is the way in which the amendments came in. Now, will your...

SENATOR ANDERSON: OK. I will. OK. if..if...

PRESIDENT: Can you make your motion around that. All right. Stand by. Senator Duis from the Rules Committee. Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I think, Senator Anderson, your proper procedure here were to make a motion as a substitute amendment and then you can proceed. I think that would take care of it.
