every time you have a bill that you don't understand, you'd never get nothing passed, Senator Lewis, I can tell you that right now. I think there has been enough work put in on this thing and I think if you throw it out now, you can be responsible for it because I won't. I think it has had plenty of opportunity for discussion and plenty of input by experts and to hold it up seems just as ridiculous as you could be.

PRESIDENT: The chair next recognizes Senator Kelly. Wait a minute. Senator Lewis. Just a minute. Senator Kelly, would you yield the floor a minute? Senator Lewis.

SENATOR LEWIS: Yes, Mr. President, I..in a conversation.. telephone conversation with the clerk, I realize that I am in error there. That if we bracket this bill, it should be on Final Reading so all amendments could be printed. People would have an opportunity to study the bill as it would be passed into law. I would so move.

PRESIDENT: You are now moving to unbracket the bill... excuse me, to withdraw your motion.

SENATOR LEWIS: Unbracket..withdraw my motion and then...

PRESIDENT: Are there objections to Senator Lewis withdrawing his motion regarding 45 and bracketing it on Select File? Hearing none, so ordered. The motion is withdrawn. We will move on to the other amendments to LB 45.

CLERK: OK. There is another amendment offered by Senator Barnett on Page 33, line 14--read.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes Senator Barnett for his amendment.

SENATOR BARNETT: I move for the adoption of this amendment. It is nothing more than a corrective language when you have signs where they can use traffic control devices and I'd move for the adoption of this amendment.

PRESIDENT: Are there need for discussion for that particular motion? The question is shall the amendment, then, be adopted. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. You are voting on the Barnett corrective amendment to LB 45. Thank you. The clerk will record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to adopt..

PRESIDENT: All right. The second Barnett amendment, then, is adopted. Do we have other amendments, now?

CLERK: None on the desk.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Cavanaugh, back to you. We have picked up, now, all the amendments. Excuse me, Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I'd like to ask Senator Barnett a couple of questions.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Barnett, will you yield to some questions from Senator Carpenter?

SENATOR BARNETT: Sure. Try to.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Now as I understand this bill in the area of, we'll take speeding, sets absolute limits and which cannot be modified by any local subdivision of government.

SENATOR BARNETT: No, that's wrong. They can be changed by
