United Airlines, Railroads, that sort of thing would be profit organization so we can't. It has to read organization. Any law enforcement officer may own stock in any organization holding a liquor license which receives its principal revenue from a source other than the sale of alcoholic beverages. We're naming like United Air Lines, where they happen to have a liquor license but there-- that's not their principal business. Railroads would be the same way. There are a number of other cases. Such officer shall not participate in any manner in the management or administration of the organization. And I repeat that--Sena--Emory--I took these amendments back with the idea as a response to Senator Schmit the other day. He asked me how I could support the bill and I took those-- I outlined it for him and then I took that same outline back to Emory Burnett and had these amendment drafted and this second half is the second half of what he came up with and I would move the adoption of the second half of this amendment.

PRESIDENT: Alright, now we've got ourselves into a parliamentary bind. Chair apologizes for this. I don't know how we could have threaded the needle some other way. Actually, Senator Goodrich, your amendment that we have adopted is an amendment to the Schmit amendment. Alright, we have that now on the Schmit amendment so now, that's the Schmit amendment as amended, okay? We need now to vote on the Schmit amendment and then we'll have to come back and see about the second half of yours even though we divided the question, but it appears to the Chair that that's the way to go. Now I'm wondering if you concur in that?

SENATOR GOODRICH: There is one thing I'd like to re--to state, however, and the Schmit amendment you are now voting on is exactly what you just voted on before.

PRESIDENT: Okay, now, Senator Whitney, did you wish to be heard on the Schmit amendment as amended now by Senator Goodrich? In essence, the Chair understands then what we've done is either duplicated or substituted but at least we have Senator Goodrich's language in with Senator Schmit's language on his amendment. Now, Senator Schmit, do you have input in this?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, I don't know where we're at. Would you read the amendment again.

PRESIDENT: Well, we have added to your amendment now, 1. (read amendment). That has been added to your amendment.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President, did you say added to his amendment or substitute for his amendment? That was the motion, substitute--

PRESIDENT: Your motion this morning was that you wanted to amend his amendment. That's what the Chair has done. You've now amended his amendment with that.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Striking his amendment with this.

PRESIDENT: No, you didn't say strike. This has been added. Wasn't any mention of strike.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Alright then, would the Clerk read what we've got as an amendment right now before the body?
