CLERK: 21 votes and you had three more indicated affirmative votes.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Did Senator Snyder vote get recorded?

PRESIDENT: Well, let's see if Senator Snyder..(interruption inaudible)..Senator Snyder voting aye.

CLERK: Senator Snyder voted aye. That makes 24.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Snyder voted aye, Senator Carstens voted aye. Senator Richendifer voted aye.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Cal Carsten voted aye.

CLERK: Senator Keyes also voted aye but he had already recorded it voting aye on the machine, so that didn't add any.

SENATOR GOODRICH: How about Carsten..Cal Carsten?

PRESIDENT: Yup. That gives us 24.

SENATOR GOODRICH: All right, then, let the next motion come.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would Senator Cavanaugh handle it?

CLERK: All right, now, I have another motion.

PRESIDENT: I think we have other motions here on it

CLERK: Motion read. Signed, Senator Goodrich.

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Gentlemen, the plan was to withdraw this motion as soon as we got the bill straightened out. We did not get the bill straightened out, and it is for that reason we have no alternative except to continue with the motion to indefinitely postpone LB 315 and it is for that reason I move the adoption of the amendment.. the motion to kill the bill.

PRESIDENT: Motion is to indefinitely postpone LB 315. Senator Chambers, did you wish to be heard and then Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I believe that this motion by Senator Goodrich should let all of you know that his objection is with the meat of the bill which is to stop police officers from having an interest in taverns and bars. Now I am not going to ask him to state for the Legislature what his true motives are but never has he been this concerned about human rights or anybody else's rights on the basis of principle. I think this bill is good. It can stand on its own merits and I will mention to you that when I was in Washington at a Law and Order conference recommended by the Governor that I be there, the Chief of Police of Columbus, Nebraska was one of those who strongly supported this kind of legislation. The Chief of Police of Lincoln supported it. The only one opposed to it is Senator Goodrich and I ask
