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be glad to give you or anyone else all the opportunity you want to question them and get their opinion. If they don't want it for the most part I don't want it. They have the responsibility, I'm only trying to be helpful.

SENATOR MURPHY: I was thinking more in specifics with the actual operators where you are bringing this issue of dispensers in. I'm sure that the Commission, that you have checked thoroughly with them, Senator.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, they object now. At one time they didn't and as I understand their objection it's not a philosophy, but in the area of the amount of work in order to license 10,000 or 15,000 dispensers and I would presume that if they object and I think they will when it gets on Select File you can recognize and accept that I'll attempt to have an amendment drawn to withdraw any reference to a dispenser in any case in this bill.

SENATOR MURPHY: Fine, thank you.

PRESIDENT: Next to speak is Senator Whitney, then Senator DeCamp, then Senator Kelly, then Maresh, then Nore.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Carpenter a couple of questions, please.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, will you yield to some more questions, please?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Yes.

SENATOR WHITNEY: I'm looking at page 9 of the bill

(End of Belt #15)

(Begin Belt #16)

and it points out there that for non-beverage users license for Class 1 is \$5.00, Class 2 \$25.00, Class 3 \$50, Class 4 \$100, Class 5 \$250. Then it says bottle club license \$250. Now the amendment says we're going to increase that for bottle club license from \$250 to \$500. Now, in my legislative district they have a lot of little small towns and I just can't quite figure out why those people have to pay a \$500' license for a bottle club.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, Senator, it's been explained to me that this is basically brought in the bill because of the request of the sheriffs in the counties in which the bottle clubs exist in order to attempt to reimburse them in part indirectly for the services they feel they will have to extend more than they now do because of the openness of the operation. Now as far as I'm concerned, you can cut it down to \$250, I don't care.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Well, now, it seems to me that since we make differences in the fees for manufacturers depending on the volume of business that possibly there should be the same thing there for bottle clubs. And I thought in listening to your discussion that your reason for exempting bottle clubs in counties with over 5500 population from keeping lists of membership, I thought that was the sheriffs that brought that out. It would seem to me that there's just not very many counties of less than 5500 population and why are we requiring that those counties with less than 5500 population keep membership lists but those counties over 5500 population which makes up most of this state would not any longer have to keep membership lists?
