SENATOR WHITNEY: Now the point is then, isn't the Liquor Control Commission already engaged in that activity?

SENATOR DE CAMP: Yes.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Then why wouldn't your motion be better just to strike everything after the first sentence in section 15?

SENATOR DE CAMP: I'd have no objection to that. I'm not going to live or die by this amendment. I'm just a little suspicious of it. Motives and everything else on it.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Thank you.

SENATOR DE CAMP: We've pretty much controlled things by making the other two amendments, the Fellman thing, the thing Fellman brought up and Kelly. Those were two things we corrected which are important.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the DeCamp amendment? Are you all through discussing the amendment? Senator DeCamp may close. Senator DeCamp's closing. No closing? Fine. Question is, shall the DeCamp amendment be adopted? All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Voting on the DeCamp amendment. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 15 ayes, 13 nays.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted. Are there other amendments on the desk?

CLERK: Now Mr. President, we have one more amendment to the standing committee amendments. Reads amendments.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY: Mr. President, members of the body, I move the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kelly, do you want to explain them? Senator Carpenter says he has no objection. Go ahead, Senator Kelly, you can explain your amendment.

SENATOR KELLY: The amendment would cover in sections 14 subparagraph 5 on page 21 to reinstate the stricken matter which would allow the cases from the Liquor Commission to be held in the district court in the county in which the infraction was... And on page 22 in sub-section 7 lines 21 and 22 this would be technical because it refers back to page, or back to sub-section 5. The object of this amendment is to not have all of the Liquor Commission business transacted in only the Lancaster District County Court.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the Kelly amendment? Question is, shall--are you all through then, Senator Kelly? All through? All right. Question is, shall the Kelly amendment then be adopted? All those in favor please say aye, those opposed say no. So ordered, the Kelly amendment is adopted. Are there other amendments now to 111 on the desk? Stand by. Any other amendments now to the bill?

CLERK: Well, there are to the bill but not to the committee amendments.

PRESIDENT: Okay. We're all through apparently amending the committee amendments. Is there a need for further discussion now of the committee amendments as amended? If not, then Senator Carpenter, you could make some motion regarding the committee amendments, as amended.
