PRESIDENT: The chair next recognizes Senator Duis. We are still debating the motion of shall LB 452 be passed notwithstanding the objection of the Governor. Senator Duis, would you yield the floor just a second to me, also. We do have quite a number of students that are here with us today and I think I would like to acknowledge their presence. We have 22 7th and 8th Grade students from Prague, Nebraska, Prague High School. Prague, I guess it could be Prague, isn't it. Prague, thank you. Yes, right. Senator Schmit's district. Mrs. Joe Kunc1, the instructors there, Mrs. Dennis Wisely, Mrs. Jim Shoup and it looks like, Reverend R. Rah. Anyway, Senator Schmit's district. We have 27 Grade school students from Immanuel Lutheran of Polk, Nebraska and that is Senator Kremer's district. Mr. Stuebgen and Mrs. Kennel. Wow, they are really testing me out with my name pronunciation abilities here. We also have 27 8th Grade students from Trinity Lutheran Of Fremont, Nebraska, Senator Johnson's district. Their instructors Harold Bergt, David Reed. All of those, I believe, are in the south balcony. We want to say welcome today and we are pleased that you have come down to hear the debate on the chance to override the Governor's veto of LB 452. We've had quite a discussion here. We are delighted to have you here today and we hope you enjoy your visit to Nebraska's capitol city and also to the capitol building which still ranks as one of the ten architectural achievements of the world. The chair next recognizes Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I hope with the interruption that we haven't destroyed the entire trend of the thought here. My statement is going to be very brief and I want to make this statement to Senator Marvel. You know a number of people have stood up here today and extolled their praises for you, those that are for you who are going to stick right with you and also those who want to clear themselves so they can vote against you. Now let me tell you something, Senator Marvel, I started here with you in 1951. I was out for a long time and I am going to stick with you because I still think you know what you are talking about and I've gone through several Governor's. No one in a short term of time accomplish and have the facts and knowledge of the Budgeting of this state of Nebraska and in the work of fiscal staffs, the equivalent of Senator Marvel. I am sticking with you. My other little short statement is, win or lose on this issue, gentlemen, you went to your mailbox this morning and I dare say for the first time this session, you got a communication. Right there it is.

PRESIDENT: The chair next recognizes Speaker Proud, then Senator Marsh. Senator Proud passing. Senator Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: Mr. President, as one of the newest members of this body and certainly the newest in experience on the Appropriations Committee but with the experience I have had so far this year, I fail to see how Senator Carstens or anyone else could blame the Legislature when the Legislature will not be controlling the Governmental Services Commission. This will be directly under the control of the Executive Branch of Government. The Governmental Services, the Governmental Services Commission will be in control of the Executive Branch. Then, the Governmental Services Commission could be a tool for the Governor, for the Secretary of State, for the Auditor, for the Attorney General, and for the Legislature, especially the Appropriations Committee.
