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two to four million dollars, at least, below the amount of money recommended by the Governor in his total appropriations package and I'd second what Senator Waldron says, I think we can consider some of these bills. If we want to adopt one or two or ten or none, that is something else again but we are below the Governor and we can adopt some necessary measures without, as Senator Goodrich childishly suggested, breasking the budget. We don't have to do anything and he knows it and we are below the Governor and if we want to turn our backs on some needs that were later in coming out of Committee because they were difficult bills while other bills were adopted and then just carte blanche say, to hell with it. We are not going to consider any more. I think it is worse than childish and I think it is about time we stop acting childish.

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit. All right. He's passing. Senator DeCamp. Excuse me, Senator Schmit. I didn't see you coming over. Go ahead.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I have an interest in LB 235 and 235A also. I don't want to lose the bill and I don't know if I have enough strength to pass it but I will support Senator Carpenter's motion and reserve the right to maybe bracket my bill later on, depending on how much strength I've got.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp. Well, are you all through discussing the motion then. Senator Frank Lewis, your light is still on. Did you wish to be called on for a second time. Thank you. Senator Syas, you do not want to discuss this issue. Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, Mr. President, I want to support what Senator Carpenter is doing. I don't know whether this is part of the master plan or not, but this is probably one of the best things that has ever happened to this state. We've passed the Budget bill without the special bills that certain Senators wanted. Now, had we put these special bills that Senators wanted on these Budget bills, then I would have been compelled to vote for some bill that I was not in favor of. Now we have passed the Budget bill. Now every individual bill has to stand on its own merit and it does not compel me to support some bill that I am not in favor of just because it happens to be on the Budget bill. Whether this is the plan of Senator Carpenter's or not because I don't know what that man has in his mind but it is one of the finest things that has probably ever happened to the people of this state. They are going to get absolutely the feeling of their Senators on certain issues and not on the general issue. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion now of the motion? All right. Senator Carpenter may close on his motion, then, which is to consider all "A" bills on Final Reading. Senator Carpenter is now closing.

SENATOR CARPENTER: The other day Senator Stahmer made a motion pertaining to the opening of this up to a limited extent in the area in which he and others in a like position had an interest, I presume, which is all right. I amended his motion in order to take all the "A" bills on Final Reading as they are now or will be. At that time, I said I was going to vote against this motion of mine which is a rather peculiar thing but I indicated to the body what I was going to do. I have another motion on the clerk's desk to put all the four or five appropriation bills at the head of General File next Wednesday. That not only opens the "A" bills but one, as I would understand, would open up 259 as a practical thing where this
