I'd rather take it up now, but I think it is completely impractical.

PRESIDENT: Gentlemen, we can't record a conversation there on the floor.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Fortunately that is so.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Goodrich is next to speak. Actually, we still have a unanimous consent motion and I'm not sure that I have heard some objections, but Senator Goodrich, do you object? There really is no debate of the thing if you object it then we come back and make a motion then, fine. But it is a unanimous consent motion at this time. Do you object or not?

SENATOR GOODRICH: I just want to know what the motion says. For example, it was read rapidly. We don't know exactly what numbers were quoted in the motion. So I want to be sure we know what the motion is.

PRESIDENT: And the chair concurs with you. It was a unanimous consent motion to place a number of bills at the head of general file for debate, I believe May 16. Would the clerk read the motion please.

CLERK: (Read motion)

SENATOR GOODRICH: I have no objections.

PRESIDENT: All right, are there objections? Senator Warner, do you object?

SENATOR WARNER: In order to say this, I'm going to and then withdraw it Mr. President. The, what I'd like, I think the appropriation bill should be fine, but I wish, I would, when we come back to discuss this thing after lunch, any other bills besides these, which are going to be picked up, should take the order behind those which have already been set previous days, but we were not able to get to, because there are several there that are extremely important. They were set up originally because of that reason and I don't think we can orderly keep pushing other bills in above those which we previously set. So I would hope over the lunch hour, any other bills except the appropriation bills, will have to follow those which had already been previously given a priority but we were unable to get at. With that, I withdraw my objection.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, we have a motion here to recess. I'm wondering if you want to hold this motion over.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I ask unanimous to withdraw the motion and let Senator Proud, I understand he has a motion pertaining to times, in which we are going to meet. I may or may not inaugurate them because we really don't need a budget on capitol improvements. We don't need it. We can live without it. Not necessary.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, asking unanimous consent now to withdraw his motion. Are there objections to that? Senator Stull, do you object to him withdrawing the motion? Hearing none, so ordered. The motion is withdrawn. Senator Stull for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR STULL: I would like to make one suggestion when we come back after lunch, I would like to suggest that
