

and bracket them there with all of the rest of the "A" bills. If this body somewhere along before we adjourn wants to take "A" bills up there they are. You are not handicapped because they are still on General File. I would like to....I don't want to have a prolonged discussion this morning, this is not the purpose of it, and I cause many of them, I am only trying to give every man a every member an opportunity to have his bill heard. He is not ready, it automatically goes to the bottom of General File and probably then it will not be considered again until we meet in January. Now if we do that does that require a suspension of the rules?

PRESIDENT: Not if you agree to it, no. No, you could only suspend the rules one day at a time anyway Senator Carpenter. If you get 25 votes, or no serious....

SENATOR CARPENTER: Then Mr. President, I move that we take the bills on General File starting with LB7. If they are "A" bills I would presume and hope that you would pass them over on to final reading without any discussion or much consideration. Then with the understanding that they would be bracketing "A" bills like the other "A" bills are now bracketed on Final Reading. This will give the Clerk and the other areas of operations of bills and amendments a chance to get caught up and a chance to work over the weekend and I think that we ought to allow them all the over time necessary in order to expedite the bills and get them ahead. I move that we start this morning when we get on General File with LB7 that we go down the first column and go to the second column and so on and so forth and lets say...see what we can do if we can't clean them all up. I don't think that we can do it today of course. But I think that we can by the day certain that I presume that somebody will a make a motion to that effect.

PRESIDENT: Alright, lets see what happens here. It is the Chair's understanding that you want to take them as they are bracketed and go right down the brackets and work in that direction. Alright lets see if we can get some discussion. Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, I just wish that Senator Carpenter would yield to a question. Senator Carpenter.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR BARNETT: What if...would you be willing to amend your motion so that lets say that some Senator on there doesn't have any of his bills until way down at the bottom of the list that every Senator at least be allowed to have one put up there and a...a..on the list that he thinks is important to him.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I have no objections to anything Senator I'm only trying to be helpful and sometimes I only bring about confusion. But I would think that if you would allow us to do this today and we are going to have two or three days left probably to do what you have in mind.

SENATOR BARNETT: I think that we should set aside one of those days to give every Senator his chance, like you say, his day in court at least with his important bill, which he thinks is important. I know that Senator Syas has one that he is concerned with and I'm sure that he will probably want that one up there and maybe I do too, I'm not quite certain.
