SENATOR MARESH: I thought that it did not seem to be proper. Thank you Senator Warner. Mr. President, I move that this amendment to the amendment be adopted.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion of the Maresh amendment to the Warner amendment.

CLERK: Read amendment.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the amendment? Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: I would like to ask Senator Maresh a question.

PRESIDENT: Senator Maresh will you yield?

SENATOR MARESH: Yes.

SENATOR WHITNEY: What I am trying to find out is what your real intent here is. You say average because that does not mean that for each individual school district. Now we do have a bill in the legislature which does base state aid to education to some extent upon percentage of cost to some extent. Now you don't want to have necessarily here a change in the bill such that it would be aid on the basis of cost, it is just for the purpose of informing people that individual schools some of them are going to get very little and others are going to get a lot, is that the only purpose of the amendment?

SENATOR MARESH: Yes, that is the only purpose. The purpose is so that the public would know that they should not expect a cut in 50% of their property tax in any district.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the Maresh amendment now to the Warner amendment. Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, Mr. President, fellow senators, anybody that has an amendment to go on this bill because this is a 150 or 160 million dollar expenditure I think that they should have that amendment written out and put on the desk of every Senator when he talks on it. Senator Maresh has offered an amendment I don't even know the wording of the amendment. I would certainly like to have it printed that way and I don't think that on this bill that we should accept any amendment unless it has been presented to our desks. Were not pressed for time so that we can't do that.

PRESIDENT: Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President, members of the legislature Senator Keyes, how many words are there Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: The amendment is 3 words.

SENATOR MARESH: 3 words. I think that this is easily understood I don't think that we need a....

SENATOR KEYES: 3 words or 30 words, I say this. If we want to work on this bill and do it right, lets get the amendments and have them in writing so that the Senators can look at them without guessing.
