SENATOR GOODRICH: I said that we had not had a chance to talk to you about any alternative to your amendment. Your amendment goes quite a ways and what we are trying to do is to determine what specifically you needed in your amendment and what you didn't need so that we could then either all join forces and go ahead with it or go our separate ways.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Would you accept it if the University was in agreement with it?

SENATOR GOODRICH: No, oh no. There are a couple of things that we are not in complete accord with. We understand that there was a letter issued by the University to the effect that they have agreed with your amendment. However we have received some different word from them that does not coincide with that and we were trying to get back to Varner or Navel or Ann Campbell or somebody and all of them are out of town. We can't confirm or deny with...we can't find out what they will go with and what they won't go with.

SENATOR CARPENTER: When you say "we" who are you talking about?

SENATOR GOODRICH: The group of Senators that have been interested in this bill, Senators Luedtke, Stahmer, however we have not been able to talk with this group, Senator Fowler, Senator Savage, and myself and we are trying to keep Senator Mahoney and Senator Syas and a group of the others all interested all informed on what we were doing.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, what are you doing?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Trying to arrive at a negotiated settlement as to what we can all settle for and yet when we do that there are obvious discourse or discord rather between Senator Luedtke and Senator Mahoney's amendments. One or the other of those can not go. So what we are trying our darndest to do is to get the settlement of that and then bring frankly you into the picture because we knew that you were interested in the bill and we just didn't have time enough to do it.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Apparently you have known that for a long time, you haven't been courteous enough to ask me to come in you just want to object to what I am trying to do.

SENATOR GOODRICH: No, no, no.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Yes, yes, yes.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Your way out in left field again.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I'm not in left field, I'm right on base.

SENATOR GOODRICH: If you will check with your colleague up in the corner there Senator Mahoney he will confirm that we
