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to address ourselves to this situation. Or let's wait until we see where else we want to spend our money. To me, is the expression of the coldest, heartlessness, that I have observed in this legislature. This is a situation that is entirely unique in the State of Nebraska as regards to the people that it addresses itself to and any man who can stand on the floor of this legislature and say, that we should avoid this situation and avoid remedying this situation, out of a sense of continuity, congruity or anticipation that some other expenditure may have some bearing on this, is a heartless man and a man who doesn't know the facts of this situation, and doesn't know how these people. Now I'll have to say that to a certain extent, my position here is political because the largest number of these retired teachers live in my legislative district and it is political because I came here to represent those people and it is political because when I conducted my campaign, I went into the homes of these people, I got to know these people and I say the retched condition in which they live. These are people that contributed the major portion of their entire life, to the educating of the children of the State of Nebraska and in return they were given a sum that a dog couldn't live on and we're going to sit here in this legislature this morning and say, we've got other things to consider. We have to look at other aspects of this problem before we spend our funds to help these people. That I find disgusting and reprehensible and any man in this legislature, who can take that position, I find reprehensible and I support Senator Lewis's motion.

PRESIDENT: Senator Keyes, do you want to be heard now?

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, Mr. President, I think that I will ask Senator Marvel a question if he has an answer yet.

PRESIDENT: Senator Marvel, Senator Keyes wonders if you will yield to a question.

SENATOR KEYES : We have so many A bills, so many dollars worth of A bills. We have so much money in the kitty. I'm wondering Senator Marvel, if you can tell me how much money we have without raising taxes to fund the bills that are already passed? And how much money we are spending on the A bills that are on this board up there? What percent we can fund of each one, if we want to do it that way or if we want to go home and not fund any of them. Or if we want to open this State up because there are 3 bills on general file that will raise 80 to 100 million dollars, if we've got the nerve, to put them into effect. I've got a bill up there, LB 91, that you can make, raise 5, 10, 20, you can make it raise 50 million dollars, if you want to and that is from people that are not paying their share, fair share right now. So Senator Marvel, could come and I think he is getting the information, if he could tell us how much money we have, that we might call in the kitty. Keep talking, I can talk, tell you about a lot of things, you know about the time that I went fishing down along the creek and the crawdads were awfully bad, but that was one of those things, a fact of life and then about planting corn, I could talk about a lot of things. You know I've heard about back in Washington where they will fillbuster by the week and I could do that and as soon as Senator Marvel gets his hand up, I'll shut up. But right now, I have---

PRESIDENT: 10 minutes at a time Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: My 10 minutes is not quite up yet.

PRESIDENT: I may interject that you are not talking--
