some people in some dire straits. There are those that we have already taken care of, those with the big voice and those with the influence to get what they want. Retired teachers don't have a big voice. Retired teachers have only given service to the people of this State for 30-40 years and now inflation has almost destroyed what small pension they have. Again I ask, not for myself, I ask not for basically the people in my district because there are few numbers of retired teachers there, but I do ask for the 3200 teachers across this State that are retired that we give them some money so that they can finish, so they can finish their life with some degree of dignity which they deserve for the time that they have given this State. Mr. Chairman, Members of the Legislature, I ask you to pass 445 and 445A.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stahmer, do you have a question? You may ask the question of the Chair. Alright, Senator Carpenter, do you have a question?

SENATOR CARPENTER: --motion.

PRESIDENT: We, he was closing, Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, I want it before we vote on this bill. I only want to, want to move, for example, because of what the Senator said, that if he didn't get it, he wanted it killed and he didn't want 445 without 445A so I want to move we read 445A first and suspend the rules, so we'll have some idea what we're doing. He doesn't want one without the other. We ought to put them in that position. If he wants to kill it which he said he did if it didn't pass, let's accommodate him.

PRESIDENT: Well, Senator Carpenter, the Chair's going to rule your motion out of order at this time and I've got my hands full here trying to dispose of this. We've had two amendments to this particular motion and it seems like that could be taken care of by the voting procedure and I don't really feel that it's germane to the issue at this particular time.

SENATOR CARPENTER: You're saying we can't--is the bill now in form to read?

PRESIDENT: Bill's in--the--yes then you can make the motion after this to flip the order on them, that's fine.

SENATOR CARPENTER: That's all I'm trying to do. When is that in order?

PRESIDENT: Just after I take the vote here now of the motion before us and that is to read 445 and 445A. Your motion would be in order.

SENATOR CARPENTER: --reverse them first.

PRESIDENT: Well, that takes a suspension of the rules.

SENATOR CARPENTER: That's what I move to do.

PRESIDENT: Fine, but you--you can't move to suspend the rules when we have a motion under debate, is, I think the problem.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well a point of order, any way, which I'm in order, because of the complexities of what the Senator who advocates the path the bill takes, that we read 445A first ahead of 445.

PRESIDENT: That's the next motion that I'll take.
