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and I don't Senator Carpenter, if I may just refer to what you just said, I doubt that it would be very workable to have them be that far away from either Omaha or Lincoln.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: The information I have from the expert is completely contrary. It would be highly suitable, desirable and would work out all right.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, I would like to ask Senator Luedtke a question if he would yield.

PRESIDENT: Senator Luedtke, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR NORE: Now on this diagnostic centers, isn't it rather necessary to have work release programs that kind of work along with them?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: No, not at all. The diagnose, I think there is a great amount of confusion as to what the diagnostic evaluation center is. This is and it has been called many times, the nerve center of any penal reform or correctional reform we have in Nebraska. The adult diagnostic and evaluation center would be that place to which you would send a convicted felon for diagnosis and for evaluation. So that you would say from there whether that individual could go out on any work release program subsequently whether that individual would be classified properly within an institution or whether it would be safe to send him back to his home community for probation or what have you. This is what this means and what we're dealing with here on the adult level is that we would have convicted, convicted felons in our program of diagnosis and evaluation, and so you would have, this is why I say that they would have this is not the community treatment program, is not a treatment program. This is an a, evaluation and diagnosis I think what Senator Carpenter is talking about is treatment, and he is right if he is talking about treatment.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I was thinking about the folks who are on work release, might have problems, but might want to be run through the diagnostic center again.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I'm sure that they would---

SENATOR CARPENTER: For reevaluation and it could be close.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I'm sure your right, that they would.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I'm wondering if how many folks here, or Senator Simpson took a few of us out to the work release programs here in Lincoln and they are real, I thought they were just great to what they are doing out there. It is over in the northeast of the university somewhere.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Senator, I might just add, you see after they are institutionalized thought, that, after they are in the maximum or medium security institution. Then they are put on work release and then the input from this diagnosis and evaluation would come in to play.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the Committees amendments? Do we have amendments on the desk then to the committee amendments? Senator Marvel, are you through with the committee amendments here?
