land to do it on. You probably got one of the finest medical centers in this country but they are landlocked to some extent. There is a limited place they can go and now is the time to get the land to let it grow on and now is the time to stop the building of these structures in the area in which they have no area of movement. They have no area, for example, of a beautiful description of a surrounding area. Now I'd like to amend this Section 38 to strike 229 thousand dollars and insert a million dollars. That's what it will take, in my judgment, in order to expand far west in order to locate this University. Now, let's look at the University. The University of Lincoln is a status school. It's a school of graduate area in which people for specialized subjects are given a higher degree. In the city of Omaha, it is not that. It's an average University of the average fellow. It's overcrowded and before we know it, it's going to have 20,000 population in the University like the University at Nebraska has. Now I'm really sincere about this thing. I've been over there time and time again and they are cramped up. They've got no place to move. Now I want to do what I can in order to put it on the same basis of the University in Lincoln, not on the same basis of what they teach but the same basic consideration in order to give them enough money in order to expand and move and to attract those people which are peculiar to the city of Omaha. So, Mr. President, I would like to move Section 38 to strike \$229,000 in both places and put a million dollars spread over the next three years.

PRESIDENT: Let's see if the chair understands how we are going to proceed here. There are several amendments, of course, up here that pertain to the Committee amendments which the chair understands are going to become the bill. Now, Senator Carpenter, do you want to consider your motion to amend right now?

SENATOR CARPENTER: No, I don't want to (inaudible) over anybody. I want to take my place. I'll get an amendment drafted for the bill.

PRESIDENT: All right. Thank you, sir. All right. Senator Stahmer, do you wish to be heard? All right. Go ahead, Senator Marvel.

SENATOR MARVEL: Now, on Page 16, Section 38, is the \$229,000 to University, UNO asked for. As I recall they said that finally all they wanted to complete in the next few years was \$600,000. We had originally \$500,000 and then they asked that we change this five hundred to make the \$229,000 land acquisition now and then on Pages 22 and 23. No, I am sorry. 23 and 24, Section 64, the other \$271,000. So you put \$271,000 with \$229,000 you come up with \$500,000 and they wanted this to air condition, to light, to add a power booster and add acoustical treatment to the field house so that it could be used for something besides the field house and so, Section 64 actually dovetails with Section 38. At the mid-center, starting on Page 16, Section 41, is the suggested appropriation of a half million dollars to buy the child saving institute east of 42nd Street. This is the amount that has been agreed upon. Page 17, Section 43, has to do with additional money to complete the School of Nursing. Also, the School of Nursing utilities are listed in Section 44. Section 45 has to do with Chadron and their request for additional renovation and we have gone over this two or three times and the staff and those that we have discussed this with still recommends that plans be developed as to how this additional space would be used in the future. \$75,000 is applied for miscellaneous renovation. At Peru, in Section 47, is the suggestion that \$4,000 be given so
