the statement was referred to when we talked about empty dormitories. I still think as we talk about capital construction, we need to talk about the maximum use of buildings that are on some of these State facilities because it seems a crime that we continue to build new buildings at the same time that some of the dormitories are still empty. This includes most of the State colleges including Kearney and therefore, perhaps we need eventually a constitutional amendment to allow the appropriation so that we can, so that we can appropriate money to use facilities that are now subsidized by revenue bonds. Mr. President, that concludes the discussion on Legislative Bill 256.

PRESIDENT: Alright, we'll take the amendments in order now on the desk. Start through the amendments on the desk.

SENATOR MARVEL: Uh, yeah. I think the first thing we need to do is to, first of all adopt the committee amendments to 256.

PRESIDENT: Let's do it this way. We'll take the--we'll adopt the committee amendments then we'll take the amendments up in the order in which they appear on the desk and that that seems the fairest way in order to handle that so, is there a need for further discussion now of the committee amendments? All those in favor of adopting the committee amendments then please say aye. Those opposed say no. Committee amendments are adopted. Now, we'll take the amendments on the order on the Clerk's desk. Before we do that we have--well, never mind, go ahead.

CLERK: The first one, Mr. President (reads amendment)

PRESIDENT: Senator Snyder, do you want your amendment read? Alright, Clerk will read the amendment.

CLERK: Reads amendments now.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Snyder.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature. This amendment is one that I have talked to many of you about. It was part of my LB 94 as originally introduced which called for outdoor recreational athletic facility renovation along with fieldhouse renovation, make it an all purpose facility and there are several amendments up there on the desk regarding various projects. PRESIDENT: One at a time.
