

SENATOR CARPENTER: The bill be held on Select File until tomorrow.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter is asking unanimous consent to bracket 111, excuse me, to hold 111 on Select File for one day.

SENATOR CARPENTER: That we adopt the E & R amendments to 366.

PRESIDENT: All those...are there any objections to holding the bill. Hearing none. So ordered. The next motion is to adopt the E & R amendments to LB 366. All those in favor of the motion please say aye. Those opposed say no. The amendments are adopted.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I move the bill be advanced to E & R for...

CLERK: Wait a minute. Just a minute. We do have an amendment to that. To add the emergency clause. Signed, Senator Carpenter and the severability clause.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I move the adoption of the emergency clause.

PRESIDENT: Is there need for discussion? The question is shall the "E" clause and the severability clause...are there two separate motions there.

CLERK: No, they are one.

PRESIDENT: All right. Shall the "E" clause and the severability clause be added to 366 on Select File. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. Adding the "E" clause and the severability clause to 366 on Select File. Thank you. The clerk will record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, 2 not voting, Mr. President, on the motion to adopt the Carpenter amendment.

PRESIDENT: OK. The amendments are adopted.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I move that LB 366 be advanced to E & R for engrossment.

PRESIDENT: Motion now is to advance LB 366 as amended. All those in favor of advancing the bill please say aye. Those opposed say no. So ordered. The bill as amended is advanced. We are now ready for the next amendment to 256.

CLERK: All right. Now, Mr. President, the next amendment is again offered by Senator Luedtke. Read amendment.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, I move adoption of the amendment. This is the second priority project for the Penal Correctional Reform program which is the replacement of the condemned Reformatory unit out here in Lincoln and whether or not this be built in Lincoln or Omaha is not the question. The question is that it must be replaced and we must have a Medium Minimum Security Building built and the beginning made on some phase construction of it. The professional consultants, as you recall, in the report that was made to this body, suggested that there be two such units, one in Lincoln and one in Omaha. One or both of them to be 250 beds which, of course, you could go up to approximately 300 beds, if you had to, on that base, but approximately 250 beds at each place, 250, 200 or 250, and that these particular units would be in the area of
