

SPEAKER: Senator Marvel. Senator Marvel, can you answer the question? Wait, one second, he will try to get it. While he is getting the information, we will recognize Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: I have a question of the chair. When this diagnostic center is completed, could we make a reservation for a party of 49? 48.

SPEAKER: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, speaker, Mr. Presiding officer, everytime a compliment like that is made it is difficult for me to resist responding but this time I am going to resist responding. I just regret that Senator Proud decided to speak against the procedure of making changes in the budget committee's recommendations at a time when we are dealing in an area that has taken a tremendous amount of study and time of the judiciary committee, other people who are interested and concerned about penal reform and the effect of locking somebody up. We all know that no matter what crime an individual has been locked up for eventually that person is going to be returned to the streets. So what happens to the person once inside an institution should be of great concern to all of this and since these studies were made and everybody would have been opposed to what the committee concluded or in favor of it would had have an entire summer plus additional months to make recommendations and suggestions and no suggestions came forth. We ought to consider the possibility of expending the money being asked for now, to provide the facilities where corrective measures can be taken, on those people who are going to be locked up. We know people are going to be locked up. These recommendations made by Senator Luedtke and Mahoney, are well considered and I hope that in spite of what Senator Proud has stated, you will vote to adopt these amendments because they fit into an overall program. Perhaps an adoption of an amendment at this time seems hasty, but the work that went into formulating the conclusions on which the money is to be spent, that work was not done in haste and I hope that you will adopt this amendment offered by Senator Mahoney.

SPEAKER: Now Senator Marvel, do you have the answer to Senator Proud's question?

SENATOR MARVEL: Senator Proud as near as can be determined, I would say that over the next 3 years, we are talking about 7½ million dollars. About \$600,000 for this year, near as the staff can---

SENATOR PROUD: Now Senator Marvel if you could, would you interpret that in terms of raise and sales and income tax. Is that possible? I'm sure it is.

SENATOR MARVEL: You mean over the next few years?

SENATOR PROUD: Yes.

SENATOR MARVEL: The difficulty here is that we're talking into some of these motions.

SENATOR PROUD: Senator, I believe, Senator Luedtke has reminded me of this, I think he is correct. That this would come out of the revenue sharing.

SENATOR MARVEL: I was going to say one of the problems involved in this is that we have 20 million dollars in revenue sharing attached to 172 which leaves roughly 10 million dollars and I haven't had a chance to add up the amendments that are put on the floor that have an impact on revenue sharing.
