PRESIDENT: To withdraw the amendment, all right. Senator Mahoney asking unanimous consent to withdraw an amendment. Are there objections? Hearing none, so ordered, the amendment is withdrawn. Okay.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay now, this is the bill that we had a discussion of on the floor here the other day, we, Senator Mahoney, Senator Carpenter, Senator Luedtke and myself were the various groups or various persons that were interested in the bill. This particular amendment that I'm proposing now is the compromise amendment that was drafted and agreed to by all parties concerned. Senator Carpenter has an amendment on the bill that would have to be pulled also.

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich, we also have other amendments really that are on here apparently ahead of yours. Let's go ahead...

CLERK: The next amendment, Mr. President, is an amendment offered by Senator Carpenter. This amendment is set out in full in the Legislative Journal on page 1642.

PRESIDENT: Okay, chair recognizes Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I ask unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment because for the most part, its contents are reflective in Senator Goodrich's amendment which he is going to offer.

PRESIDENT: Any objections to withdrawal of the Carpenter amendment? Hearing none, so ordered.

CLERK: The next amendment then, Mr. President, is another amendment offered by Senator Carpenter also found on page 1642. Do you want to withdraw all of your amendments?

PRESIDENT: All right, are there objections to the withdrawal of that amendment? Hearing none, so ordered. The two Carpenter amendments are withdrawn. Are there other amendments now to the bill?

CLERK: All right, the next one again is another Carpenter amendment and those will be withdrawn. The next one again is a Carpenter amendment and will be withdrawn. The next one then, Mr. President is an amendment offered by Senator Goodrich which I don't believe was in the Journal.

PRESIDENT: Okay, Senator Goodrich, we're back to you with another amendment here.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay, this is the only amendment that would be adopted to the bill subsequent to the Warner amendment in lieu of the Committee amendment and this amendment fits with that particular amendment, so this particular amendment, the adoption of this amendment would--how do I say this?--would meet the agreement of all the parties concerned. It is the compromise amendment, in other words. Now, would, okay, Vince would you read that to the body slowly so that they know exactly what's in it?

PRESIDENT: Attention, please. The reading of the amendment.

CLERK: Reads amendment.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay, now, you'll notice that we have the word may at the top. We did not change Veterinary Medicine and Surgery, that is already in the statute books. The words commencing fall of 1976 have been stricken so that it's just left the way, Veterinary Medicine and Surgery is left the way it's on the statute books right now. We've made no change whatsoever in that. We did add some new things to the bill in the form of this bill would add some new things to the statutes
