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from a by-product that is very valuable in livestock feeding. So I think that the cost of this fuel and others, may as we think it may, be because we are going to get a by-product here. I think this is a golden opportunity to make the federal government available, we do have a plan and we ought to make it available to them. At the same time, these people said that we feel in order to relieve this tight situation we're going to have to go into a crash program that is going to be comparable in cost of going to the moon. Now that is a lot of money and they suggested, if they can be of any help, to let them know and they will consider it.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Now also, if we are going to export grain as we know we are, we are having a lot of it deteriorate because of the lack of transportation among other things. That would use that up. Now do you think that the federal government would be interested in a pilot plant of financing the thing and hold a part.

SENATOR SCHMIT: I suggested this to Mr. Dean and he said let us know what you are interested in and we'll see if we can help. We've got this man's card right here.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, what can I, make a suggestion and I'll turn it over to you. Mr. President, I'd like to move that a committee of a undetermined size, who understands specifically this problem, who has contacts in Washington in the previous attempts to do the same thing. That as soon as this body gets to a point where it is going to adjourn or we have a few days available for nothing else, that this body authorize the collection of this committee irrespective of size, in order to go to Washington and see if number 1, we can get the money. All or part of it. If the materials are available and if they are not, will they expedite through the powers of federal government, the acquiring of the plant and the facilities. Number 2, if the whole amount is not available, we still have our Aida bonds. Which might be issued by some local sub-division of governments and then we have for example, other methods of small businesses for which they would assure 90% and the banks 10%. There is many ways, so let's do something to focus on the problem to see if we can't get something done. So I move Mr. President, that we now authorize by some sort of action to determine later, that those who desire to go and those who are knowledgeable in this field, be authorized to go to Washington and bring back a report to see if we can't do something now when the need is here and we may create another industry in this State that is way beyond our, we've had them in the past. They've fallen of their own weight because of circumstances existant then which I think are materially changed now. So I so move Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Carpenter, we'll dispatch the resolution here first and then your motion will be in order. In the meantime would you be willing to commit some of that to paper for us in the way of a resolution here please. So that we can have this. I'm not sure that we caught it all. I got parts of it. But let's go on with the discussion of LR 84, and then we'll take up Senator Carpenter's motion. Next to speak was Senator Waldron and then DeCamp and then Johnson. We're still speaking on LR 84.

SENATOR WALDRON: Mr. President, members of the legislature since Senator Carpenter brought up bill LB 587, there have been some people interested in this bill. It did not receive a public hearing, but if it is all right and no objections from the body, I thought we could have a meeting tomorrow in the East Lounge at 1 p.m. on LB 187 and so we can talk to some of those people that might have objections to it and the Senators can become better informed on the provisions of that bill.
