PRESIDENT: Alright, Senator Goodrich may answer.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Fine.

PRESIDENT: If you care.

He also has another problem and that is; that he does not know how to associate with other people. To give you an example and I hate to say this because I know it's being televised: Just ask the employees, the State employees that he has come in contact with. He has demonstrated repeatedly an arrogant attitude of I am King and You are a Peon and Don't You Forget It! He--I don't think our State employees have to take this type of attitude from anybody whether he be a State Senator, a Governor or a board member. I feel that when we've got this kind of a man that is completely inexperienced in the field of higher education which he is being appointed to, we then combine that with an arrogant, arbitrary attitude and you have a very sound reason for rejecting this man and it is for that reason, as I stated before, that I'm urging the rejection of my motion to approve.
