PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Waldron.

SENATOR WALDRON: Mr. President, as a legislator, Senator Carpenter, I know this proposal has failed before. That is why I think you know the other parts in the bill are probably more important than this part. Now that is not to you, but I think they are. There is many other provisions in this bill which are important and this is an important issue too and it would help out State of Nebraska considerably, and that is why I'm not opposed to it, but I hate to take the chance of loosing the whole bill and if you don't think we will do that, and you don't think you might jeopardize other bills in relation to the whole area, then I have no objection to it.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, I don't know of course, I don't have that kind of vision and in this case unfortunately I don't have my wife's intuition. But I'll say if this results in the bill not passing on the final reading, so be it. There is nothing in this bill that we can't live or live without, and I'm getting a little irritated at 7 whole salers, who have enough money and enough power in order to do what they are now attempting to do by bringing up conditions that don't even, they ought to be for it. The ruling that the Attorney General gave, that they couldn't deliver, they made thousands, tens of thousands of dollars, because they save that delivery expense. They didn't have to have the trucks. The thing I don't understand about them, because normally they are pretty smooth. You think they gonna lose any money in this bill, of course they are going to average the freight rate throughout the State. Let's say to Senator Luedtke, the people in the chamber of commerce in the city of Lincoln, want this bill. Because they feel it will be an advantage and neutralize the advantage that other people have, that they don't have today. Is there anything wrong in saying that everybody buys at the same, F.O.B. price destination. If that is the method to defeat this bill, let is be defeated.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Waldron.

SENATOR WALDRON: Just to respond to Senator Carpenter, I want the body to understand, I don't represent whole salers. Senator Carpenter and myself have been sponsors of bills to put the State in the whole sale business and buy out the interest of all the whole salers in the State and I still support that bill and at anytime we can get the votes here we will do away with the whole salers in this State.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Believe me, you will have that next session.

SENATOR WALDRON: Good, I was wondering why---

SENATOR CARPENTER: Together with a bill not to have any exclusive right on brands. That I'll guarantee you.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp, then Senator Kelly, then Senator Richard Lewis.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, members of the legislature, as you know, I worked trying to correct the original bill and get it straightened out and I think right now we have one of the best bills here and the amendments he is trying to put on, are extremely important and extremely valid. For example, one of the points, he didn't bring up is that this would tend to clean up some of the shadier operations and I'll explain exactly how it would do it. If you have too many bars in a small town, and one of they starts having a situation where they can't break even or can't make money, then they start resorting to improper tactics.
