SENATOR KREMER: Vince, do you have an amendment up there?
Signed by myself on 187?

CLERK: 187?

SENATOR KREMER: Yes. No, that's not the one. It had
to do with the Game Commission when they acquire property
without condemnation. I can't get my figures without that--
I move that it be passed over for the present.

PRESIDENT: Alright. Any objections to passing over 187?
Hearing none, so ordered. We'll hold it. We did adopt the
amendments to it, the E&R amendments, so we'll just hold it
over. That is 187.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Mr. President, I move LB 306A be
advanced to E&R for Engrossing.

PRESIDENT: Motion is to advance LB 306A. All those in
favor of the movement of the bill say aye. Those opposed
say no. The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Mr. President, there is one more that has not yet
been reported in. Committee in Enrollment and Review
report read.

PRESIDENT: Are there amendments?

CLERK: No, Mr. President, there are amendments.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Mr. President, I move the adoption of
the E&R amendments to LB 400.

PRESIDENT: You've heard the motion to adopt the E&R
amendments to LB 400. Is there a need for discussion?
All those in favor of adopting the amendments say aye.
Those opposed say no. Amendments are adopted.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Mr. President, I move LB 400 as amended
be advanced to E&R for Engrossing.

PRESIDENT: You've heard the motion to advance the bill as
amended. All those in favor of that motion say aye. Those
opposed say no. Ayes have it, so ordered, the bill as amended
is advanced.

CLERK: Mr. President, your Enrolling Clerk reports (read)
Mr. President, Legislative Resolution, LR 86 (reads) LR 86.
Be laid over.

PRESIDENT: Resolution will be laid over.

CLERK: Mr. President, we now have that amendment to 187 if
you want to take it up.

PRESIDENT: 187? The amendment to it?

CLERK: By Senator Kremer.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kremer, apparently we have your amendment
now to 187.

SENATOR KREMER: LB 187 sets forth the procedure to be used
in acquiring private property for public use. Now this
amendment applies to the Game Commission who in turn cannot
acquire property by eminent domain unless provided by the
