about establishing these residencies in out-state Nebraska and I think that perhaps that is what is going to have to be done. I would suppose that the time will come when the AMA will have to change their residency requirements because we are just not going to have the facilities available in a sparsely populated state like Nebraska to properly train these people. I am going to repeat what I said earlier. We talk about increasing the size of the medical school class and we take great pride in the fact that we have gone from 115 to 130 and from 130 to 145. But you are throwing money down a rat hole if you let these fellows leave the state. I would suggest that we take a long hard look at it and it is no skin off my back if you don't pass the amendment but I think that it is a good amendment and I would urge you also that the \$100,000 as money for the drug treatment program according to the fiscal staff can be matched by both rehab money from the federal government and it will extend those dollars. I would hope that you would go and vote favorably for the amendment and I would close at that.

PRESIDENT: Question is shall the other half of the Schmit amendment be adopted. All those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. A record vote has been asked. Voting on the other half of the Schmit amendment. First one carried, yes. We are voting on the second half of the Schmit amendment, the question is divided. Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. President, if you recall we amended the Civil Defense act with a broad declaration of principle in so far as the Civil Defense, Civil Air Defense is concerned in the state of Nebraska. AT the present time for the most part they have really got a lot of people who are able to fly planes who are members of the patrol but they don't have anything to fly. In my town for example, as I recall, we have got 40 pilots and they have no air craft, either aircraft helicopters or anything else.
